## Paducah and McCracken County Leaders emphasize growth, collaboration, and nuclear opportunities at Paducah Chamber of Commerce Power in Performance Breakfast

Local officials delivered a hopeful outlook for Paducah and McCracken County, highlighting strong economic momentum, major projects underway, and the community's emerging role in the nation's nuclear energy future.

Paducah Mayor George Bray reflected on his five years in office, noting the challenges of beginning his term during COVID-19 and the dramatic progress since then. He pointed to visible development including the riverfront project, the new sports park set to open this spring, upgrades to the 911 system, and expanded services at Barkley Regional Airport with new routes to Chicago and Houston. Downtown

revitalization continues with new businesses, redevelopment of the U.S. Bank building, and additional hotel construction.

Bray credited collaboration among city commissioners, staff, and partners as the driving force behind success. He recognized experienced city department leaders in public safety, public works, finance, technology, and parks who support both residents and the many visitors who come to Paducah daily to work, shop, and dine. Future priorities include more housing, Southside redevelopment, new police and fire facilities, and continued support for nonprofits addressing homelessness and community services.

McCracken County Judge-Executive Craig Clymer echoed the

optimism, calling the state of the county "incredibly strong." He cited improved finances, emergency communications upgrades, investment in public safety, neighborhood revitalization, and the joint city-county sports park as key accomplishments.

Clymer emphasized that Paducah is poised to become a "boomtown" due to nuclear-related development at the Department of Energy site. Two uranium enrichment companies, large federal investments, remediation projects, and a proposed artificial intelligence data center are expected to bring thousands of construction jobs and hundreds of long-term, high-wage positions. He noted that the data center will supply its own energy and not

increase local utility rates and that small modular nuclear reactors are expected in the future.

Both leaders stressed the importance of preparing the workforce and expanding housing to support incoming jobs. Partnerships with schools, unions, and military veterans are expected to help fill new career pathways in nuclear and technology fields.

They concluded with a unified message: economic growth is strengthening neighborhoods, supporting local businesses, and creating opportunities that will keep families and young people in the community. Paducah and McCracken County, they said, are not just growing — they are growing stronger and better positioned for the future.

# Chronic Wasting Disease detected in Ballard County wild deer

FRANKFORT, Ky. - The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has confirmed a new case of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in a wild deer in Ballard County. This is the third case of CWD confirmed in Kentucky's wild deer population, and the second case in Ballard County.

Two independent types of tests were performed on tissue collected from a 2-1/2-year-old male white-tailed deer that was hunter-harvested on Nov. 16. The preliminary screening test indicated the tissue was considered a suspect positive. The secondary test agreed with the first test and confirmed the presence of the abnormal proteins that cause CWD.

Chronic Wasting Disease is an always-fatal neurologic disease that affects deer, elk and other species in the deer family. It has previously been confirmed in a wild deer in Ballard County in December 2023, a wild



deer in Pulaski County in October 2025 and nine deer from a captive cervid facility in Breckinridge County, with one in October 2024 and eight in August 2025.

With Ballard and surrounding counties already within the CWD Surveillance Zone due to the previous detection of the disease in 2023, no changes are expected to the surveillance zone counties or management requirements. Counties in the CWD Surveillance Zone include Ballard, Breckinridge, Calloway, Carlisle, Casey, Fulton, Graves, Hardin, Henderson, Hickman, Laurel, Lincoln, Marshall, McCracken, McCreary, Meade, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Union, Wayne, Web-

ster and Whitley.

Discovered through the department's routine CWD surveillance efforts during modern gun deer season this fall, this most recent detection was found in the vicinity of the original detection in Ballard County from 2023.

"Our team continues to work hard to monitor the health of the state's wild deer herd," said Ben Robinson, director of the Wildlife Division for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "Through routine surveillance and monitoring, we are able to closely track any new detections of CWD, both within existing surveillance zone counties and around the state. While we are always disappointed

to learn of new detections, we will continue to closely monitor the disease and keep hunters informed."

Due to the nature of the prions that cause the disease, additional CWD detections in locations where it was previously confirmed is likely. Prions, which are misfolded proteins, are highly contagious.

"Unfortunately, this new CWD-positive detection was not unexpected," said Dr. Christine Casey, wildlife veterinarian for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "CWD-infected animals shed infectious prions into the environment, where they can survive for years, making additional detections in the immediate vicinity of previous detections more likely."

Since 2002, Kentucky Fish and Wildlife has CWD-tested more than

70,000 deer and elk from across the state. A CWD Response Plan has been in place most of that time. Hunters can aid Kentucky Fish and Wildlife's statewide monitoring efforts by dropping off the heads of legally harvested and telechecked deer for CWD testing and aging at self-serve CWD Sample Drop-off sites or via sample mail-in kits. This service is provided at no cost to hunters. Detailed location information, instructions and additional resources may be found on the CWD Sample Drop-Off Sites and CWD Sample Mail-in Kitwebpages on the department's website (fw.ky.gov).

There is no known cure or vaccine for CWD, and the disease is always fatal in infected animals. The disease is not known to be transmissible

to people, but as a precaution the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends not consuming meat from deer that test positive for the disease. Kentucky Fish and Wildlife always recommends not consuming meat taken from animals that appear to be sick or in poor condition.






# Prepare to file in 2026: Get Ready for tax season with key updates, essential tips

WASHINGTON — With the 2026 filing season quickly approaching, the Internal Revenue Service is urging taxpayers to take a few simple steps now to prepare for filing their 2025 federal income tax returns. Visit Get Ready on IRS.gov for checklists, updates and no-cost filing options.

One of the most important steps taxpayers can take is to access their IRS Individual Online Account. IRS Individual Online Accounts are available 24/7, to view account information, make payments, manage communication preferences and protect tax information.

## Use direct deposit

Due to the presidential executive order, Modernizing Payments To and From America's Bank Account the IRS is phasing out paper tax refund checks. The IRS encourages taxpayers who do not

have a bank account to open one so they can receive refunds by direct deposit.

## Review new 2025 tax law changes

Recent legislation, such as the provisions in the One, Big, Beautiful Bill, includes several new deductions and credits that may reduce tax bills or increase refunds. Beginning in 2025, to be eligible to claim certain credits for other dependents, the taxpayer and their spouse, if filing jointly, must have valid Social Security numbers or Individual Taxpayer Identification Numbers issued on or before the due date of their returns (including extensions).

## New Trump Accounts for eligible children

Parents, guardians and other authorized individuals will be able to open Trump Accounts, a new retirement savings



vehicle for children under the age of 18 with a valid SSN. A pilot program contribution of \$1,000 will be available for children who are U.S. citizens and born from Jan. 1, 2025, to Dec. 31, 2028. Visit trumpaccounts.gov for details.

## Income from

## payment apps and online sales

All income from part-time work, gig activities or sales of goods and services is taxable. Form 1099-K, Payment Card and Third Party Network Transactions, will be issued by payment card companies for any amount and by payment apps and online marketplaces when payments exceed \$20,000 and more

than 200 transactions occur for the year.

Digital assets reporting requirements

Taxpayers who bought, sold or received digital assets, including cryptocurrency, stablecoins or NFT, must report those transactions. Some taxpayers may receive Form 1099-DA from brokers. Regardless, all taxpayers must answer the dig-

ital asset question on Form 1040 and report any related income, gains, or losses. Visit Digital Assets for more information.



PADUCAH — McCracken County pulled way to defeat Graves County 74-62 in a mid-season boys' high school basketball game on Friday, Jan. 2.

The Mustangs excelled offensively throughout the matchup.

McCracken County shot 54.4 percent (31-of-57) from the field. The Mustangs shot 36.4 percent (four-of-11) from three-point range.

McCracken County shot 72.7 percent (eight-of-11) from the free throw line.

Owning an advantage inside, McCracken County outrebounded Graves County 25-19.

Miles Woodfork led McCracken County to the win, pouring in a game-high 30 points for the Mustangs. Woodfork connected on 11 of 20 two-point field goal attempts.

Accompanying Woodfork in double figures for McCracken County, Jackson Klope and Jay Martin netted 10 points apiece.

Klope recorded a double-double, clearing out 11 rebounds for the Mustangs.

Eight different players entered McCracken County's scoring column. The additional scorers for McCracken County were Maxx Tanner (six points), Jackson Diaz (six points), Aaron Adams (six points), Owen Grogan (four points) and Garrett Miller (two points).

Graves County suffered the double-digit loss despite shooting 58.3 percent (28-of-48) from the field. The Eagles shot 30.0 percent (three-of-10) from three-point range.

## Kentucky Fish and Wildlife increases incentive for invasive carp removal

FRANKFORT — Commercial fishers now have more incentive to catch and remove invasive carp from Kentucky waters.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has increased the commercial fishing incentive from \$.10 to \$.15 per pound for the harvest of invasive carp from Kentucky Lake and Barkley Lake.

This change aims to keep pressure on invasive populations of silver carp, bighead carp, black carp and grass carp, which threaten native fish and aquatic habitats.

"We have several lines of evidence suggesting our management strategy is reducing invasive carp populations in both lakes," said Joshua Tompkins, coordinator for the Aquatic Invasive Species Program. "To keep that trend going, we're adapting our efforts to maintain harvest at effective levels. Our success is due to the hard work of our commercial fishers and strong federal support."

In 2024, commercial fishers harvested more than 15 million pounds of invasive carp through Kentucky's Invasive Carp Harvest Program, bringing the total to more than 74 million pounds since 2013.

Recent data show signs of population decline: no young silver carp have been detected in either reservoir since 2015 and average catch rates have dropped

sharply since 2019. Another indication of lower population numbers is that invasive carp are showing improved body condition, indicating less competition for food.

The use of deterrent technology is also paying off. The BioAcoustic Fish Fence at Barkley Dam along the Cumberland River, which uses sound, light and bubbles to deter fish movement, has reduced upstream migration by about 50 percent.

In addition, the department's Experimental Commercial Fishing Methods Program is testing new gear and techniques that allow large-scale removal of invasive carp while minimizing impacts on native species. Some commercial fishing crews have proven capable of removing more than 60,000 pounds of invasive carp per day from Kentucky waterways.

"Increasing the incentive to commercial fishers will help ensure we keep suppressing invasive carp numbers," said Dave Dreves, director of the Fisheries Division for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "It's a big win for anglers and boaters that recreate on Kentucky and Barkley lakes, as well as for the vital \$940-million tourism economy of the Western Waterlands Region."

# Loss to Missouri leaves Cats in 'hard space' with 0-2 start in SEC

LEXINGTON, Ky. (KT) — Kentucky hasn't been known for its 3-point shooting this season, but there have been some memorable moments produced by the Wildcats as the program celebrates the 50th anniversary of Rupp Arena.

Senior guard Otega Oweh provided a memorable moment when he connected on a 3-pointer from behind the arc on the opposite end of the court, a trey measuring nearly 74 feet as time expired at the end of the first half, giving the Wildcats life after trailing by seven to Missouri in the first half.

Despite the long-distance three that helped the Wildcats overcome another sluggish start, Kentucky dropped its second straight Southeastern Conference encounter with a disappointing 73-68 loss to Missouri on Wednesday night.


Oweh finished with 20 points, the fourth

time in the past six games he's eclipsed the 20-point plateau, but it wasn't enough to defeat the gritty Tigers, who overcome an eight-point deficit in the final four minutes to notch their first win at Rupp Arena.

The loss left the Wildcats (9-6, 0-2) in a "hard space" in Mark Pope's second season at Kentucky and searching for answers. Winless in the SEC one week into the league schedule, Pope hasn't lost hope in his squad.

"It's a hard space," he said. "This is tough. It's not the way we intended to start SEC and really is exactly what we have in our hands right now. When you go through a hard time, which everybody does, the question is, how much does it take to break you? I'm not about to break. This group's not about to break. We're no place there."

Largely behind preseason Player of the Year Oweh, the Wildcats were able to provide some bright

moments against the Tigers. In one sequence in the second half, Oweh fed Brandon Garrison with an ally-oop assist for a slam and then Garrison returned the favor with an assist to Oweh on a 3-pointer as part of a 6-0 run that gave Kentucky its largest lead of the game at 66-58 with 4:34 remaining.

From that point on it was all Missouri as the Tigers (12-3, 2-0) outscored the

hosts 8-0 in the final 1:14 and scored 15 of the last 17 points to secure a memorable victory.

"I thought our guys came to try to compete the best they could," Pope said. "Our execution down the stretch was poor. You have to be able to execute better to win games."

Missouri coach Dennis Gates dedicated the program's first-ever win at Rupp

Arena to former Wildcats assistant coach Leonard Hamilton. Gates served as an assistant coach under Hamilton at Florida State.

"(I) had a long conversation with Leonard Hamilton (Tuesday) night," Gates said. "Obviously, we know who he is around these parts. (He) gave me some great wisdom. He's an unbelievable mentor to me. This game was dedicated to him."

Behind his team's steady play and Kentucky's inability to execute when it mattered, Gates and the Tigers made history of their own.


"We call it a fire drill when we get under the two-minute mark with out of bounds plays and things like that," Gates said. "We didn't turn the ball over, and that's the part that won the game for us."

In an effort to jump-start his squad after a 89-74 loss at No. 13 Alabama last Saturday, Pope revamped his lineup and started Jaland Lowe and Jayden Quaintance for the first time this season.

Lowe finished with nine points and four assists, while Quaintance had one point and four rebounds.



# Kentucky Launches Mobile ID to Enhance Travel and Security

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Kentucky residents now have a new, secure option for proving their identity while traveling. Gov. Andy Beshear today announced the launch of Kentucky Mobile ID, a voluntary digital version of a standard or REAL ID driver's license or state ID that can be used at Transportation Security Administration (TSA) checkpoints at more than 250 airports nationwide.

The new Mobile ID aligns with Team Kentucky's ongoing commitment to modernize licensing

services while helping protect residents from identity theft. Stored securely on a smartphone, the digital ID allows users to verify their identity while sharing only the information required for a specific transaction. Officials emphasized that Mobile ID does not replace a physical driver's license or ID card, which Kentuckians should continue to carry at all times.

"Mobile ID offers Kentuckians more options for air travel, while further protecting them from identity theft or having their private information

shared," Gov. Beshear said. "We want our families to be safe and feel safe while they are traveling, and this is just another step Team Kentucky is taking to increase safety for our people."

Kentucky Mobile ID is protected by a phone's PIN, Touch ID or Face ID, making it more secure if a device is lost or stolen than a physical wallet. Its authenticity is verified through the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) using existing driver licensing records. The digital ID can be used for air travel, age-re-

stricted purchases or identity verification at participating businesses and agencies.

Kentuckians with a valid state license, permit or ID card can request a Mobile ID through the app. Those who apply with a standard license but later upgrade to a REAL ID will see their updated status reflected in the app within days, even before the physical card arrives. Federal REAL ID enforcement began May 7, 2025, requiring REAL ID-compliant identification for commercial air travel and access to military

bases.

KYTC Secretary Jim Gray highlighted the privacy benefits of the technology. "A digital ID serves as an addition to a physical ID, allowing Kentuckians convenience when proving their identity," Gray said. "One of the biggest benefits is limiting how much personal information you have to show during a transaction."

Kentucky joins 18 other states and Puerto Rico in offering IDEMIA's Mobile ID app. In the Commonwealth, Mobile ID is accepted at TSA checkpoints at Cin-

cinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport, Louisville Muhammad Ali International Airport, Blue Grass Airport in Lexington and Barkley Regional Airport in Paducah.

Officials noted that not all businesses or agencies accept Mobile ID, and state law still requires drivers to present a physical license during traffic stops. More information about Kentucky Mobile ID is available at [drive.ky.gov/mobile-id](http://drive.ky.gov/mobile-id).

out as much because they have so much information just right at their fingertips."

Flowers said that word of mouth referrals are the primary way clients find Hope Center, and HSAs are trained to understand life issues impacting their peers and are willing to take a stand in the schools.

"[Teens] are more apt to go and reach out to someone like that than ... to give us a call or to text us—which we want them to have that freedom ... to reach out to us," Flowers said.

That's why Hope Center started "Real

life issues, build relationships with their peers and serve as bridges between high schoolers and the Hope Center.

"We noticed with our teenagers when we're going out into the schools, we noticed right away that ... parents aren't talking to their kids," Flowers said. "Christian parents aren't talking, they're not having hard conversations. And the youth of today deal with so much more than my generation did, and they need somebody to talk to and talk through these things."

"Real Talk" includes setting up a table with information about the pregnancy center, giveaway materials

about sexual health and healthy relationships.

"They have great questions," Flowers said. "And it's about their own sexual health a lot of times. Sometimes it's about relationships. I've been part of conversations all the way down into sixth grade where grooming was happening. Some of them were on their way to go and meet somebody, and we were able to get with the guidance counselor of the school and to stop that."

Flowers noted that unless people are in the schools and talking about real issues teenagers face, it's easy to pretend such hard things don't exist. But authenticity draws in the youngest generations.

"They're so sick and tired of fake. They want real information," Flowers said. "They want people who really care about them and aren't using them as a political ploy, you know, and I think that you're just seeing this whole generation mobilized towards speaking truth and standing up for what you believe. And so we want to be a driving force behind that. We want to be cheering them on and to be helping them in every way."

Teens are listening. Several went to Hope Center for STI testing after engaging with HSAs at the "Real Talk" table. When a group of girls made a pact to get pregnant

together, they knew Hope Center was a safe place and showed up for free pregnancy tests and support.

"We have a sign in our front that says, 'When you're here, you're family.' And so, building those relationships that last, thus giving us the opportunity to pour Jesus every time we get to see them, pray with them, talk to them about the Lord, get to see that grow and then salvation happen—like, that's the ultimate of what we do, you know?" Flowers said. "We have a good, better, best in what we do. And the best is when we get to see that client ultimately come to salvation."

Maya Queen, a junior, has been a Hope Student Ambassador for two years. She's helped at

the "Real Talk" table multiple times, and became an HSA out of a desire to share about the pregnancy resource center.

"I wanted to be able to help out in the community, and I was just drawn to the Hope Center because I've heard of their program and what they were involved in and I really just wanted to help reach out with their mission," Queen said.

HSAs must be attending a local high school in Hickman, Fulton, Carlisle or Graves Counties and active in their churches.

Queen, a member of Beulah Baptist Church, said she is pro-life because of her faith. "I'm a strong Christian believer and the Bible says that each life is precious and God made all of us in his image. We're fearfully and wonderfully made in his image. So I just think that everyone should get a chance at the life that God has planned for them."

"I am pro-life because I think everybody should have a chance, no matter if you're in the womb or if you are eighty years old," said Olivia Prince, a first-time HSA who attends High Point Baptist Church.

Evan Green, a senior who is also a repeat HSA, said she believes what the Bible says about life. "I believe that it's important to be pro-life, in that every life does matter because God loves every life."

Green also said the HSA program is a "great opportunity" to both share the love

of Christ and help her community—and a highlight is outreach to people her age.

"We do a lot of little things that may go unnoticed, but the Hope Center is just such a great resource, even if it's not used by some of our community. You can see the impact it has on other lives."

In addition to monthly training meetings, HSAs are actively involved in the community and Hope Center's work—giving out candy on Halloween, setting up a float for the Mayfield Christmas Parade, serving during Hope Center's fundraising banquet, staffing the center's Client Christmas event, organizing a community baby shower, adding items to local blessing boxes and surprising small business with sweet treats and kind notes.

The Hope Student Ambassadors are an overflow of Flowers' passion, and Hope Center's commitment, to equipping young people to make healthy choices.

"A lot of [pregnancy resource centers] have walked away from youth development and it's a passion of mine just because I believe prevention is the very first step," Flowers said. "We want to love anybody and everybody that walks through our door, but if I can get to [them] before they need us and they can make better choices, and different choices that will impact their life so that they don't need us, then that is a win, one hundred percent."



# Putting farm waste to good use

Agricultural waste poses a challenge for farmers, even if the subject does not garner a lot of attention outside of rural areas. Farms generate enormous amounts of organic waste, including crop residues, fruit peels, sawdust, and livestock manure. Farmers must decide how to get rid of agricultural waste legally and economically.

If not disposed of properly, farm waste can pollute the environment, particularly the air and waterways like rivers and streams. It is best for everyone to mitigate agricultural waste to create further hazards. Farmers may not have considered re-

cycling some agricultural waste, but it is a way to transform this potential hazard into something that can be used on the farm itself or sold commercially. The following are some considerations for putting farm waste to good use.

## Compost

Animal waste, crop residues and additional organic material can be combined to create nutrient-rich compost. Compost is utilized to improve soil structure, fertility and water retention. This helps reduce reliance on chemical fertilizers. By investing in large-scale composting tools, farmers can process hundreds



or even thousands of tons of organic matter each year. While some can be used on the farm, the excess can be sold at a profit.

## Biogas

Biogas production is carried out through a process known as anaerobic diges-

tion (AD). The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says AD involves bacteria breaking down organic matter, such as animal manure, wastewater biosolids and food wastes in the absence of oxygen. As the bacteria digest the waste, they gen-

erate biogas, which is mostly comprised of methane. Capturing biogas can reduce greenhouse gas emissions on a farm, and the biogas can be turned into a renewable energy source to power electricity, heating or transportation, according to Prime Dumpster Incorporated.

## Digestate

Anaerobic digestion does not only produce biogas. Digestate is the solid and liquid effluent remaining after the process, says the EPA. Digestate can be used in many applications, including animal bedding, fertilizers and a foundation material for creating

bioplastics and other bio-based products.

## Recycling

Certain items used on farms cannot be turned into compost or fertilizer. However, recycling containers, tires, cardboard, rubber, and plastics offers the potential for these products to be made into new items. Western Packaging says recyclable items can be kept separate from other waste so they can have new life outside of landfills.

Seeing farm waste as an asset and not a problem can help farmers save money and resources.




# How rising food demand is affecting farming

The population is growing and so is its demand for food to fuel those extra bodies. Harvard Business Review reports the global population has quadrupled over the last century. It's predicted that, by 2050, the population will exceed nine billion people.

The world is not able to feed all of its inhabitants, according to Penn State. There are more than one billion people who are estimated to lack sufficient food, and two billion who do not receive adequate nutrition. Researchers from the Institute on the Environment at the University of Minnesota concluded that, to feed the world by 2030, yields on maize, rice, wheat, and soybeans will have to rise by 60 to 110 percent. At the start of 2023, projections show them only increasing by 45 to 60 percent. There are a few reasons why food supply may not meet up with demand.

- Climate change: Climate change is predicted to cause issues to crop yields, especially in portions of the world where



the population is growing the fastest. For example, a recent NASA study published in the journal Nature predicts that high greenhouse gas emissions may cause corn output to decline as early as 2030, but wheat output would increase. Farmers may need to roll with the punches and shift operations to cope with the environmental changes.

- Decreased commercial farming interest: Fewer people are working in farming. Land prices for expansion, new government mandates and regulations, and the impact

of immigration and trade policies have made farming less attractive than it once was. Fewer commercial operations result in a diminished food commodity output.

- Consumer waste: Food loss and waste (FLW) is a widespread issue, posing a challenge to food security. The World Bank estimates 30 percent of all food across the globe is wasted, amounting to 1.3 billion tons of food per year. The average global household wastes 74 kg of food each year, according to the United Nations Environment

Programme's 2021 Food Waste Index. Food waste is an issue that needs a solution as the world looks for ways to feed an expanding population in the decades to come.

In order to improve output, farmers have to make some changes. These can include investment in tools and technologies that enable farmers to

apply nutrients more precisely and at lower cost, advises the Environmental Defense Fund. Seeds that need less water and fewer nutrients, as well as new fertilizers that are less likely to be lost to air and water, are some additional ideas. Farmers also may want to employ green practices, such as hydroponics and drip irrigation, if they haven't already, to improve efficiency and cut costs. The public also may need to petition their lawmakers to make it easier for farm workers arriving on working visas to man the fields.

Food demand continues to rise, and it has become challenging for agricultural operations to keep up.

I can't remember when I was so happy at the end of a deer season. Not that I was happy it was over, but I was happy it ended in such a memorable way. Let me tell you about it. I spent four days in the Midwest as I do every year. During this time of the year, the deer are coming to food – including the big bucks. The bucks' reactions were altogether different. Some stayed at the edge of the field, some refused to come in, and others hurried to a distance in the field far enough away from any perceived danger.

It really was amazing to me to watch all the different ways these bucks responded to this strange but stationary piece of equipment. I'm sure their different reactions came about according to their age, maturity, past experiences, and genetics. Each one responded in a way they thought was right. And in a way they thought was best for everyone. Even though many of the other deer did not agree. I wish humans could learn this lesson.

Have you ever wondered why some people react differently from you? Have you ever wondered why someone can see the same scene, and tell the story from a different perspective? Have you ever wondered how someone can see a problem and decide the best way to solve

Skunk spray is easy to smell, but difficult to see. When we lived in Murray, Kentucky, our dogs were sprayed by the gag-inducing gas (nothing out of the ordinary), and I had difficulty expelling the odor from our home because I couldn't tell where it was. I could
