AG UPDATE CONTROLLING BAGWORMS

for Ag and Natural Resources

I get several calls a year about bagworms on trees and shrubs in people's yards. They are usually on evergreen species but can be on other plants like maples, oaks and locust trees. Unfortunately, by the time most people notice the bagworms, it is too late to do anything about it. When they are in the bag, it is almost impossible to get a high enough dose of insecticide on them to do any good.

Bagworms are leaf feeding pests as larvae. Early instar caterpillars create small holes in leaves or needles or may produce windowpane like feeding symptoms. As they grow, they will be able to feed on more of the leaves. They may completely defoliate an area of the plant, or they may leave behind the largest veins of the host leaf.

Feeding damage from bagworms tends to start at the top of the host plant. As feeding progresses, the canopy of the tree or shrub will become thinner. Over successive generations, they will move down the plant and symptoms may spread. In evergreen hosts, the bagworm often induces "bronzing" a symptom where formerly green sections have become bronze or brown. These areas will likely never recover.

The most seen characteristic of bagworms is the bag itself. They have been described as pinecone like by some. When

the caterpillar first emerges, the bag they construct is conical but as they mature, the bag may become more diamond shaped in profile. The bag is tough and brown and covered in material from the host plant like leaf bits, needles, and berries.

Inside of the bag is the caterpillar which can range from 1/8th inch long to over an inch long depending on the instar of development. Caterpillars are mostly brown in color, with the head and thorax having stripes of yellow-white and black. Pupae are located inside of the bag and are dark brown. Males will emerge as winged moths which are small and brown

with fuzzy antennae. Females on the other hand emerge as adults that resemble the caterpillar stage, they have no wings, reduced legs, and will never leave the bag.

Bagworm eggs begin to hatch in May across most of Kentucky. Upon hatching, the newly emerged caterpillar will either stay and reinfest the tree they were born in, or they may "balloon" away to a new site. Ballooning involves releasing a small strand of silk and using that to ride wind currents before landing on a new host.

The caterpillars will progress through seven instars of development. As they progress, the larvae will get larger and

will also enlarge the bag they live in. After about 6-8 weeks of feeding, the larvae will be ready to pupate. Typically, this occurs in the early fall and the caterpillars pupate inside of the bag they have constructed. Sometimes the caterpillar will take its bag and leave the host plant before pupating, leading to bags being found on the exteriors of homes, on fences, and other odd locations.

Once pupation is complete, the winged males emerge to mate with the females inside of their bags. The females produce a pheromone that recruits males to their bag for mating to occur. Male moths live for a short period

while females may live for 1-2 weeks as adults. Females lay their eggs in the remains of their pupal case, where those eggs will overwinter to emerge next year.

Bagworms can cause enough damage over successive years to seriously harm trees and shrubs. One possible management strategy is to go to infested plants in the winter and snip the bags out of the plant. Use sharp scissors, shears, or a knife to cut the loop holding the bag to the plant. Following this procedure will remove the female bags with eggs and hopefully prevent an infestation in the spring.

If bagworms infestations are caught in

May or June when the caterpillars are still small, biorational insecticides such as Bt (*Bacillus thuringiensis*), neem, and Spinosad will manage populations. If the bagworms are not discovered until later in the season, then applications of pyrethroid insecticides (such as bifenthrin) or carbaryl may be needed to try and curtail the caterpillars. These likely won't eliminate the population but would limit damage. A newer product, dinotefuran, is a systemic insecticide that you can apply to the soil around the tree and the insecticide is taken up by the tree and be there to control the worms when they are small and just starting to feed. This must be done before they hatch to make sure there is enough taken up in the plant prior to feeding. This might be a good option for trees with known bagworm problems from the year before.

If the infestation is localized to one plant, then the physical removal method mentioned before is an option late in the summer as well. Any bagworm bags removed while the caterpillar is alive should be thrown into a bucket of soapy water to kill the insect. Do not remove the bags and throw them on the ground around the tree, they will simply return to feed more!

History Comes Alive at Fort Jefferson Patriot Grave Marking

Step back into Kentucky's frontier history during the 3rd Annual Sons of the American Revolution Patriot Grave Marking ceremony on Saturday, June 6, at 2 p.m. at Fort Jefferson Memorial Park, located one mile south of

Wickliffe. The free community event honors the 63 men, women and children who died at Fort Jefferson between 1780 and 1781 during one of Kentucky's earliest settlements. Organizers will also recognize five additional patriots this year as part of the continuing effort to

preserve the story of Fort Jefferson and Clarksville. Visitors will experience living history through musket firing demonstrations, a parade of historic flags, patriotic music and presentations highlighting the courage and sacrifice of America's frontier settlers during the Revolu-

tionary War era. Fort Jefferson was once the largest settlement in Kentucky and served as General George Rogers Clark's western headquarters during the American Revolution. Organizers say the event offers families and history lovers a unique chance to connect with the region's

earliest roots and honor the pioneers who helped shape the nation. Before the ceremony, the Ballard-Carlisle Historical and Genealogical Society will open at 11 a.m. for tours and access to the Fort Jefferson Reading and Research Room, which houses a large collection of

Revolutionary War frontier history documents. Residents and visitors alike are encouraged to attend this meaningful event and help celebrate America's 250th anniversary while honoring the legacy of the patriots connected to Fort Jefferson.

Sen. Danny Carroll Secures Millions for Western Kentucky Infrastructure and Advances Nuclear Energy Initiative

Kentucky State Sen. Danny Carroll, R-Paducah, delivered major legislative and infrastructure victories during the recent General Assembly session, securing millions of dollars for Western Kentucky while advancing innovative

energy policy for the Commonwealth. Among Carroll's most significant accomplishments was the passage of Senate Bill 57, which establishes the Nuclear Reactor Site Readiness Pilot Program. The legislation positions Kentucky as a leader in advanced nuclear

energy development and prepares communities such as Paducah for future economic growth tied to small modular reactor technology. Carroll successfully secured \$75 million in authorized government expenditures for the initiative. The program allows approved

projects to receive up to \$25 million to support early site preparation, licensing, and construction permitting for small modular nuclear reactors. Supporters say the investment could attract long-term private sector development, strengthen energy reliability, and create high-paying jobs across the region.

In addition to energy policy, Carroll helped deliver substantial transportation funding for Marshall and McCracken counties. More than \$18.1 million was secured for Marshall County highway and bridge improvements, including \$8.75 million designated for Interstate 69 upgrades and \$7.5 million for improvements along U.S. Highway 62.

Carroll also partnered with House Floor Leader Steve Rudy to secure \$41.5 million in localized road project funding

Beyond infrastructure and economic development, Carroll played a key role in advancing legislation aimed at protecting vulnerable youth. He handled Senate passage of House Bill 669, a veto-proof measure ensuring Kentucky foster youth can retain their own Social Security survivor benefits rather than having those funds redirected. Carroll said the session demonstrated a commitment to strengthening Western Kentucky's infrastructure, energy future, and quality of life for families and communities across the region.

Taking a moment to appreciate our soulmate

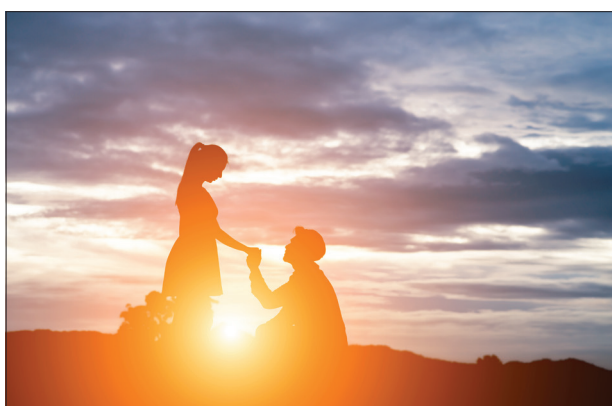

than your pieces. He is not only making you into a quilt to be admired and remembered, but also into a blanket to be used to bring comfort and assurance to others.

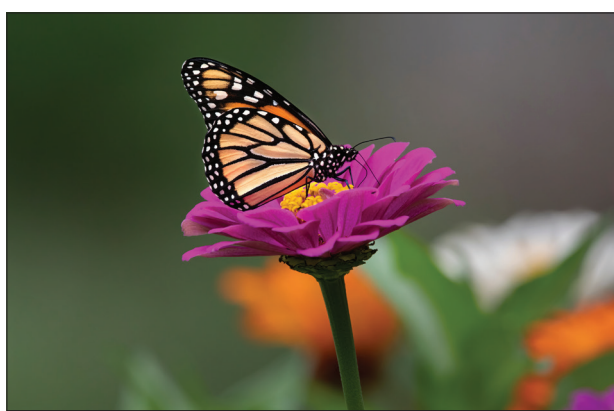

We fear losing our salvation, out-sinching the grace of God, disappointing our Savior one too many times, or being snatched away by the world or the devil. But according to the Scripture, there is something infinitely greater than a glass pane standing between us and



falling away from the faith: the nail-scarred hands of Christ Jesus.

Jesus graciously assured that there is no reason for His sheep to live in trepidation: "I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand" (John 10:28). Believer, your salvation does not

depend on your grip of Christ, but upon His grip of you—and He will never let you go (cf. Heb. 13:5). He likewise promised, "All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never cast out. . . . And this is the will of him who sent me, that I should lose nothing of

all that he has given me, but raise it up on the last day" (John 6:37, 39). And your name is inscribed in the Book of Life with immortal ink—even graven in the palms of His hands (Rev. 3:5; Isa. 49:16), and it cannot be erased by your transgressions nor made more permanent by your obedience.

Is this not why Paul exclaimed, "I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which

is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:38-39, KJV)? God's grace-kept, eternally-secure, and never-lost children have no reason to live like anxious butterflies. Rather, there are a thousand reasons to mount up with wings as eagles and soar in the joy of blessed assurance. For all who are in Christ, the Lord's promise remains unchanged: "Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness" (Isa. 41:10).

Invasive Alabama bass found at Lake Linville in Rockcastle County

FRANKFORT — Biologists with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources have confirmed the presence of Alabama bass hybrids in Lake Linville, marking the first time the species has been detected in Kentucky waters. Lake Linville is a 356-acre lake located near Mt. Vernon in Rockcastle County.

During routine fisheries surveys at Lake Linville, biologists collected two fish initially identified as spotted bass that raised concern. Subsequent genetic analysis confirmed that both fish were Alabama bass/spotted bass hybrids.

The extent of Alabama bass presence in Lake Linville is currently unknown. Fisheries biologists with the department are conducting expanded genetic testing of Lake Linville's bass popu-

lation. Findings from this effort will help guide future management strategies for the lake and surrounding waterways.

Alabama bass, native to the Mobile Bay basin in Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia, have caused devastating impacts to fisheries outside their native range across several southeastern states. Recent introductions of the species by anglers in Tennessee, Georgia and North Carolina have significantly altered native populations of smallmouth bass, largemouth bass and spotted bass through interbreeding and competition.

Kentucky Fish and Wildlife biologists are most concerned about the potential for Alabama bass to interbreed with native smallmouth and spotted bass populations in Kentucky.

The resulting hybrid fish would eventually eliminate existing smallmouth bass and spotted bass over time. Home of the world-record smallmouth bass, Kentucky's premier smallmouth bass fisheries, including Lake Cumberland and Dale Hollow Lake, could face serious risk if anglers continue to move Alabama bass into Kentucky waters.

"The discovery of Alabama bass hybrids in Lake Linville is concerning for fisheries in Kentucky," said Marcy Anderson, program coordinator for the Southeast Fisheries District for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "It's not simply about an introduction of a new species. It's also the long-term negative consequences for the native bass species that anglers frequently target."

Previous Alabama bass introductions to

new waters in other states have shown that they quickly become the dominant species and drastically reduce the abundance of largemouth bass through competition. Alabama bass do not grow as large as they typically do in their native environment and invasive populations are usually composed of fish much smaller than the largemouth bass they displaced.

Alabama bass are nearly indistinguishable from native Kentucky spotted bass based on appearance alone, making genetic analysis the most reliable method for identification. However, differences between Alabama bass and other black bass species — such as largemouth bass and smallmouth bass — can sometimes be observed through jaw size, lateral band coloration and overall

body coloring.

"For many years Alabama bass were considered a subspecies of spotted bass and many anglers still refer to Alabama bass as "spots," said Dave Dreves, director of the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Fisheries Division. "Unfortunately, Alabama bass are very different from our native Kentucky spotted bass so it's critical that these fish are not moved to new waterbodies."

Public engagement remains critical in addressing the spread of invasive species such as Alabama bass. Anglers and boaters are reminded not to move fish and plants between water bodies, as doing so can unintentionally introduce invasive species into new ecosystems. Following all state regulations is essential to protecting Kentucky's aquatic resources.

"Invasive species negatively impact the local environment and economy when introduced into new areas," said Jeffrey Herod, aquatic invasive species coordinator for the department. "In the case of Alabama bass, there is sufficient information based on research from fisheries biologists from multiple states that anglers should anticipate negative impacts to aquatic habitat, and specifically declines in largemouth bass, smallmouth bass and spotted bass populations if Alabama bass become established."

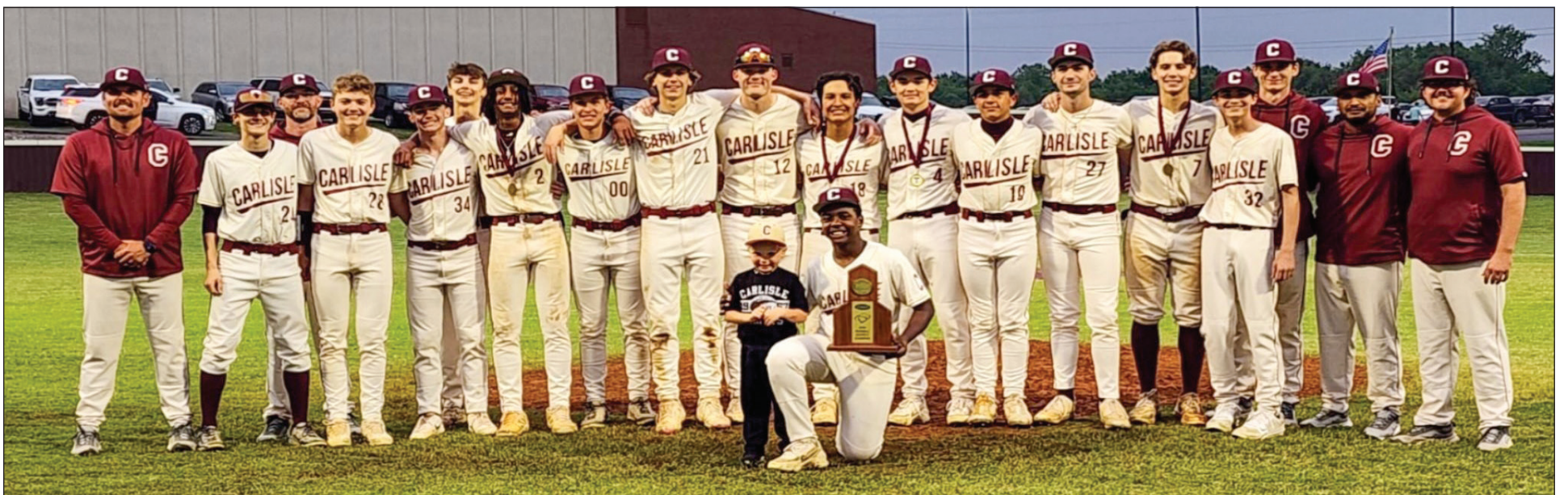

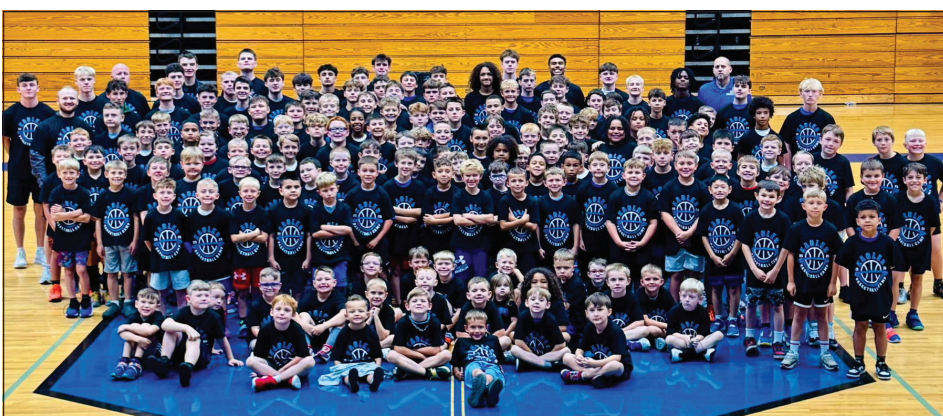

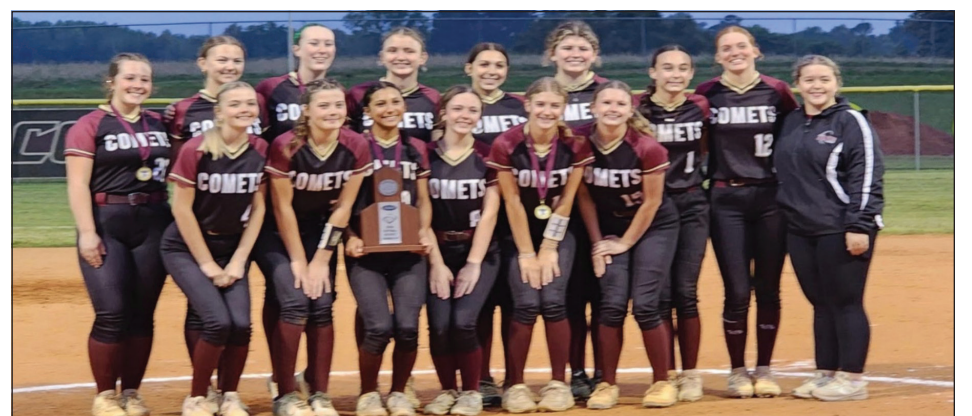

“America is the home of the free because of the brave, and we have so much to give thanks for this Memorial Day as we honor the heroes who sacrificed for our freedom and our country,” said Gov. Beshear. “To honor them and their families, let us commit to a more perfect union by finding common ground and moving our country forward for everyone. God Bless America.”

According to the United State Postal Service (USPS), facilities that are open on the holiday must fly the U.S. flag at half-staff.

The U.S. flag must be flown at half-staff from sunrise, or the hour when it’s raised, until noon. Then, hoist the flag to the peak of the staff, where it either must fly until the close of business, or no later than sunset (unless

the flag is lighted all night). The flag protocol also states that when the U.S. flag is flown at half-staff, all other flags must fly at half-staff, too.

For facilities that fly the flag at all times and are closed on Memorial Day, the flag should be lowered to half-staff when the

facility closes prior to the holiday. Return the flag to full staff when the facility re-opens on Tuesday, May 26. Gov. Beshear encourages all individuals, businesses, organizations and government agencies across Kentucky to join in this Memorial Day tribute.

KSP adds bulletproof Rook vehicle to fleet

FRANKFORT, Ky. (KT) – Kentucky State Police (KSP) has added a specialized “Rook” armored vehicle to its fleet, enhancing the agency’s ability to respond to calls while prioritizing the safety of both troopers and the public.

“Our brave law enforcement officers put themselves in harm’s way to make our communities safer,” Gov. Andy Beshear said. “Providing them the resources they need not only boosts public safety, but also helps ensure they can return home safely to their family

at the end of each shift.”

The Rook is a versatile tactical vehicle designed to protect officers in complex law enforcement operations, including hostage situations, barricaded subjects, riot response and natural disaster scenarios. Its compact design allows it to operate in confined spaces where the use of traditional armored vehicles may be limited.

Interchangeable attachments, such as a hydraulic fork for removing obstacles and an armored personnel cage for a protected approach, allow troopers to intervene in danger-

ous situations. KSP’s Rook is the only such vehicle in the state and one of only 108 in the nation. The vehicle was purchased in December 2025 using asset forfeiture funds, which are funds seized from criminal activity that are in turn used

to enhance public safety at no additional cost to Kentucky taxpayers.

“The Kentucky State Police is committed to providing our troopers with the best equipment available to safely resolve critical incidents,” KSP Commissioner

Phillip Burnett Jr., said. “This purchase is the direct result of successful investigative efforts by our troopers, turning funds that were derived from criminal activity into tools that help us combat crime and protect Kentuckians.”

The positive impacts of the Rook have already been proven. Since its acquisition, KSP’s Special Response Team has deployed the Rook eight times, and it has proven to be a life-saving tool, helping breach barricades and protect troopers while serving high-risk warrants.

By investing in advanced tools like the Rook, the KSP says this helps them continue their mission to protect and serve the people of Kentucky while ensuring troopers are equipped to meet evolving public safety challenges.

Ex-KYTC employee facing theft charges

MAYFIELD, Ky. (KT) – An investigation by Kentucky State Police (KSP) Post 1 detectives led to the arrest of a former Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) employee, now living in Tennessee, for thefts that occurred while he was with KYTC.

On April 13, KSP Post 1 at Mayfield received information from the KYTC Office of Inspector General reporting a

suspected theft from the KYTC Driver Licensing Regional Office in Mayfield. It was reported to KSP that Hunter Simmons, while employed with KYTC, stole payments for services rendered by KYTC at the driver licensing regional office.

A thorough investigation led to findings that Simmons was employed as the Administrative Section Supervisor for both the Mayfield and Paducah KYTC Driver Licensing Regional Offices. During his employ-

ment, between April of 2024 and January of 2026, Simmons was found to have stolen

\$88,688.50 from the Mayfield location. An investigation of the Paducah office is still

ongoing.

The Mayfield investigation was presented to the Graves County grand jury on May 12, 2026, resulting in the indictment of Mr. Simmons for the offense of Theft By Unlawful Taking (greater than \$10,000 but less than \$1,000,000).

After the indictment was handed down, Hunter Simmons, 33 years old, now of Bradford, Tenn., was located and arrested by the Gibson County, Tennessee Sheriff's Office on May 19, 2026.

On May 21, 2026, Simmons was extradited from Tennessee and brought to the Graves County Restricted Custody Center where he was served with the indictment warrant.

The investigation remains ongoing by Detective Propes with additional charges possible in McCracken County, once that investigation is concluded.

Simmons has his next appearance before a judge scheduled for Monday at Graves Circuit Court.

Summer meals programs for students back in place

FRANKFORT, Ky. (KT) – The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) announced on Tuesday their plans for the annual summer meals program for students, during the time classes are not in session.

During the summer months, the Summer Food Service Program – also called Sun Meals – is administered by the KDE. The program provides meals at no cost from late May through August to children 18 and under in low-income areas. KDE partners with school districts and

community organizations statewide to offer nutritious meals, recreational fun and educational activities while school is out of session.

This summer, more than 2,000 sites will serve meals to Kentucky children. The number of Summer Food Service Program meals and meal sites has increased each year, as more people have awareness of, and participation in, the program has occurred.

In rural areas, meals may be available for multiple days and in some cases, provided “to go” to children, parents or guardians.
