Fall Medication Take Back Day October 25th

Be a part of the addiction and pollution solution by bringing your expired, unused, and unwanted pharmaceuticals and disposing of them at the **Dubois County Medication** Collection on Saturday, October 25 in collaboration with the DEA National Pharmaceutical Drug Take Back Event. The Jasper State Police Post, located at 2209 Newton Street, will host the collection from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Due to scheduling and resource challenges, this fall's event is limited to the State Police Post only.

The Jasper State Police Post site is a drive through event. Medications are accepted anonymously and either the resident or volunteer places them in the box for proper disposal immediately after they are received.

The Jasper Police Station located 309 E. 6th St also accept pharmaceuticals 24/7

year round in their drop box. Dubois County residents are asked to rid their homes of expired, unwanted, and unused medications.
Unused drugs are a common household health threat that can be lessened when you clean the old and unused meds out of your home.
Don't forget vitamins, ointments, drops, herbal products, meds that should have been kept cold but were not, and aerosols not in pressurized containers.
These pharmaceuticals will be accepted at the collection site

No sharps (auto-injectors, needles, syringes, IV catheters, blades, lancets, auto-injectors, infusion sets, connection needle/sets, and glass), infectious materials, (anything containing bodily fluids) or waste will be collected. This collection is for private citizens only. No collections will be accepted from for profit businesses or health facilities.

The partners of this event remind residents that correct disposal of medications creates a safer and cleaner environment, and greater public awareness reduces illegal activities

and scavenging of personal property and public waste receptacles. Pharmaceuticals should never be poured down the drain or flushed down the toilet. Doing so potentially pollutes our waterways, ground water and drinking water. Some drugs may kill the beneficial bacteria in sewage treatment plants and septic systems and may produce resistant infectious bacteria. Burning releases toxic pollutants into the air, and if thrown in the trash, medications can be scavenged from trash receptacles to be illegally sold or ingested. Keeping old medications in the home is unsafe as children or adults may confuse the medication and it creates the potential for theft of certain medications. This collection event is the perfect opportunity to clean out the medicine cabinet and dispose of medications properly.

Please contact any partner or watch the local media for information on future medication collection events.

Real-world training strengthens Huntingburg firefighters and community

The Huntingburg Fire Department recently received a valuable training opportunity, thanks to the generosity of Mor For Less. The business allowed firefighters to use a vacant house, giving crews the rare chance to train in a real structure rather than relying solely on props or simulations.

Firefighters spent the day practicing essential techniques including size-up, search and rescue, VEIS (Vent, Enter, Isolate, Search), and hose handling. These hands-on exercises help improve response

times, enhance teamwork, and build confidence in high-pressure situations.

Department officials emphasized that continuous training is a vital part of maintaining readiness. Fire emergencies are unpredictable and often dangerous, and ongoing skill development ensures firefighters are able to act quickly, make sound decisions, and protect both lives and property. Regular practice also helps crews adapt to evolving equipment, tactics, and safety standards.

According to the department social media post said, training in actual buildings provides

an invaluable level of realism that better prepares firefighters to respond effectively during emergencies. Opportunities like this directly benefit both the department and the community by keeping firefighters sharp, confident, and capable.

The department encourages anyone with a vacant structure to consider partnering in future training exercises. Such collaborations help strengthen local emergency response capabilities.

Officials expressed their sincere appreciation to Mor For Less for supporting their ongoing commitment to protecting the community.

Free neuter program helps pit bulls and their people

The Dubois County Humane Society is making it easier for local pet owners to do something wonderful for their dogs — and the community. During October and November, the shelter is offering free neuter surgeries for male pit bulls and pit bull mixes through its "No Nuts November" initiative.

The program is open to Dubois County residents with eligible dogs. Surgeries are available by appointment, and registration is completed online. Dogs must have a current rabies vaccination. If owners don't have proof, the vaccine can be provided at the time of surgery for \$20.

While the online system shows a \$125 cost for surgery, qualifying dogs will receive the procedure at no charge.

The program has already had several signups, and the Humane Society is encouraging more families to take advantage of this opportunity. "This is a big step toward reducing unwanted litters and giving

more dogs the chance at a loving home," the organization shared.

In addition to preventing overpopulation, neutering can also help improve a dog's health and behavior, making life better for both pets and their people.

Appointments are limited, so early registration is encouraged.

Pass Jesus to the next generation

He won over many of the Jews and many of the Gentiles. When Pilate, at the suggestion of the leading men among us, had condemned him to the cross, those who had loved him at the first did not forsake him; and the

tribe of Christians, so named from him, are not extinct to this day." (http://www. facingthechallenge. org/josephus.php)

Tacitus - A Roman Historian wrote about Nero's hatred for the Christians. He said the name 'Christian' comes from the name of 'Christ' who is the founder of the Christian religion. Scholars say all the details that Tacitus give matches the details in the Bible. (http://www.christianfaith.com/html/page/ did_jesus_exist)

Pliny the Younger, a governor in those days, wrote that there was a new sect of people called Christians. He talks about how the Christians sang praise to their leader, Christ. Pliny the Younger, Letters 10.96 (http://www.christian-faith.com/html/page/did_jesus_exist)

The truth is, Jesus has been debated for centuries, but His name and power can't be disproved. Paul said Apollos, who was a disciple, an eloquent man, and mighty in the scriptures, debated the Jews publicly. Paul says Apollos "publicly proved by the scripture that Jesus was the Christ." (Acts 18:28).

Pass Jesus on to the next generation. He will always have a people who believe, but we want it to include our own families. So, pass him on to them.

The beauty of being broken before God

Have you ever wondered if God is listening to you? One of His many divine attributes is that He is Omnipresent which means He is everywhere at the same time. His presence constantly permeates the atmosphere whether it be on earth, in heaven, or throughout the universe. This is how He knows everything that happens and every word that is said. He knows every tree that falls in the forest and every thought that has ever been imagined, as well as the motives and intentions of every

I enjoy taking walks so that I can have the privacy to talk to Him. It gives me comfort and peace to know He is there, even though I do not hear Him reply in a literal voice. Like you, I've discovered that it's easy to share with Him, but difficult to hear and comprehend what He is saying. Sometimes I will just stop talking and listen for Him in

the quiet. As Psalm 46:10 talks about being still and knowing that He is God, we are encouraged to stop allowing stress to make us afraid, and to learn how to rest in His presence. A key to developing a strong personal relationship with God is to have a holy reverence for who He is and this begins with being broken before Him.

Since Romans 10:17 says, "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ" we know that hearing always precedes obedience. LIVING ON PURPOSE

I heard a story years ago from a minister who said one morning he climbed a mountain and was sitting on a boulder contemplating the majesty of God, when nature revealed a profound message about the Christian life. He noticed something very interesting about the grass with fresh dew on it. The blades that stood tall

and extended to the sky had no droplets of refreshing water, but the blades that were bent to the ground had several droplets on them. The bent grass reminds us that seasons of spiritual refreshing often come when we bow before Him in a state of gratitude and humility. It's the attitude of descending that enables us to experience the reality of His majesty.

Psalm 51 is one of my favorite chapters and verses 16-17 declare, "For you will not delight in sacrifice, or I would give it; you will not be pleased with a burnt offering. The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise." The life that stands tall and arrogant is not in the spiritual position to bask in the presence of His glorious presence. When the dew drops of heaven fall upon the heart that is calloused and distant, they roll off leaving that soul to remain dry and discontent.

What I do requires me to travel. I'm not sure how many days I'm gone from home, but it's quite a few. If my trip is ten hours or less, I prefer to drive. Driving lets me pack my truck with as much gear as possible. When these trips don't involve a hunt, I can load plenty of the stuff that is associated with my ministry. When the trips include hunting, I can pack bows or guns as well as all the gear I need. I really like doing it this way. Planes limit me unless I pay an extra expensive fee. And while taking weapons on a plane is doable, it can also be a hassle. So, when I fly and hunt, I usually borrow a friend's gun. This also gives me an excuse if my hunt is unsuccessful. I can (and do) blame the gun I was given.

I actually blame the guy who let me borrow his gun, because I firmly believe he gave me one with a crooked barrel. (looking at you John and Jason) Being able to borrow anything from a friend is a great benefit. It fills a need when our own is unavailable, broken, or simply something we don't have. Borrowing is a temporary exchange that allows one person's supply to meet another person's need. It is using someone else's plenty in the presence of someone else's lack.

There are times in each of our lives when what we are lacking, or what is broken, or what is absent is our faith. Not our religion, but our trust. Our faith in God. There are times when our own beliefs

have been damaged so much, we don't trust them to take us much further. It's like an old truck that we have patched and patched so much that it's good for a few miles, but we just don't trust it on a long haul. If I can bring this home, I would say it this way. We've prayed, and we're tired of praying. We've sought God, and we're tired of seeking. We've forced gratitude, and

we're tired of faking it. We've confessed and promised until we've exhausted every word we know. And if we're just being honest (and God loves honesty) our faith is not taking us anywhere, and the only words we can conjure up to God, is, "God, I got nothin'." And if that's where you are, that's okay. You can borrow faith from those who still have it. Be open and

honest. Let someone know -- let several know-- you have crippled faith- you are unable to bring yourself to Jesus you are unable to muster up even a mustard seed of faith. And what they will do for you, is break through a crowd, bust a hole in a roof, and lower you to Jesus. And when Jesus sees their faith, your healing will come. Because borrowed faith still moves mountains.



Variables that could elevate your risk for stroke

The World Stroke Organization notes that more than 12.2 million individuals experience stroke each year across the globe. Perhaps even more telling, the WSO reports that, globally, one in four people over age 25 will have a stroke in their lifetime.

Stroke is indeed a threat to public health. However, despite the prevalence of stroke, individuals are not helpless against it. Various risk factors for stroke are within individuals' control, and it's never too early for adults to prioritize stroke prevention. With that in mind, the following are some of the most common risk factors for stroke, courtesy of the WSO.

 Elevated systolic **blood pressure:** The American Heart Association notes that an elevated systolic blood pressure means the upper number on a blood pressure reading is between 120 and 129. Systolic blood pressure measures the pressure your blood is pushing against the artery walls each time the heart beats. Individuals diagnosed with elevated systolic blood pressure are urged to discuss the ways to lower that number, as the American Stroke Association notes high blood pressure is the most significant controllable risk factor for stroke.

• High body mass index: A recent study published in the journal *PLOS One* found that body mass index was associated with stroke risk among diabetes patients. The study found that the risk of ischemic stroke, which occurs when a blood clot or fatty plaque blocks a blood vessel in the brain, was higher among obese patients compared to patients who are overweight or normal-weight.

• Smoking: The WSO reports that someone who smokes 20 cigarettes a day is



six times more likely to have a stroke compared to a non-smoker. One of the links between smoking and stroke risk surrounds carbon monoxide and nicotine. Smoke from cigarettes contains both carbon monoxide, which reduces the amount of oxygen in a smoker's blood, and nicotine, which makes a smoker's heart beat faster. Those variables combine to raise blood pressure, which has already been noted as a significant risk factor for stroke.

 \bullet Alcoholconsumption: A study published in the journal Neurology examined the link between alcohol consumption and stroke. The study found that high levels of alcohol consumption are associated with a higher risk for all types of stroke, and even moderate intake, defined as between seven to 14 drinks per week for women and seven to 21 drinks per week for men, was associated with higher risk for all types of stroke.

These are not the only common risk factors for stroke. In fact, the WSO reports high fasting glucose, air pollution, low physical activity, poor diet, high LDL (i.e., "bad") cholesterol, and kidney dysfunction are some additional common risk factors for stroke.

Though stroke affects more than 12 million individuals across the globe each year, many of its more common risk factors are manageable.

Field soil sampling program available for Hoosier farmers

INDIANAPOLIS - The Indiana State Department of Agriculture (ISDA) and partners throughout the state have worked with the Gulf Hypoxia Program (GHP) to develop a no-cost program with a focus on increasing the knowledge and use of soil sampling as a nutrient management practice to benefit

farm operations. The program, titled Indiana's Mississippi River Basin Soil Sampling Program, is open now for applicants.

"This program is helpful and valuable for our Hoosier farmers," Lieutenant Governor Beckwith, Indiana's Secretary of Agriculture said. "By offering no-cost access to soil sampling, this initiative supports farmers with the tools and knowledge to make smarter nutrient management decisions. I encourage our farmers to apply!"

ISDA promotes the importance of nutrient management and the principles of the 4R **Nutrient Stewardship** framework. The 4R framework incorporates using the "Right Source, Right Rate, Right Time, and Right Place" to achieve cropping system goals. This program focuses on soil sampling and testing as it is a key component, and first step, of developing a plan for nutrient management. Soil sampling provides an assessment of the soil's fertility which can be used for making fertilizer application recommendations, assessing available nutrients over time, increase farmer profitability and enhance environmental protection by reducing the risk of nutrient loss. This project was developed to help further Indiana's State **Nutrient Reduction** Strategy efforts.

"A no-cost program for farmers to utilize for soil testing is a great tool in this farm economy," said Don Lamb, director of the Indiana State Department of Agriculture. "Healthy soils are vital for crop health, animal health and conservation. I am very proud of our department for managing this crucial on farm program and we encourage both row crop farmers and pasture owners to apply!"

This program includes row crop fields, pastures, hay and specialty crops located within Indiana's portion of the Mississippi River Basin. Eligible landowners will be prioritized by acreage enrolled (i.e., 100 acres

or less), fields that have never been soil sampled and fields that haven't been sampled regularly (i.e., within the last four years). Further prioritization may be implemented based on ISDA's workload capacity. This program excludes hobby gardens and private lawns.

Interested landowners can sign-up online at ISDA's website or by reaching out to **Nutrient Stewardship** Program Manager, Ophelia Norman at soilsampling@isda.

Sign-ups begin Tuesday, September 2, 2025, and ISDA is accepting registrations until Friday, October 17, 2025, or until funds are exhausted.
