Deadlines for election filing at the Marshall County Clerk's Office

Filing for the 2026 elections officially opened on November 5, 2025 and the Marshall County Clerk's Office has already begun preparations for the upcoming election cycle. There are over 25 positions at the city and county levels that are set for the 2026 ballot, with the filing deadlines ranging from January 2026 all the way until June 2026. The positions that are up for election include judge/executive; all three commissioners; jailer; coroner; county attorney; sheriff; property

valuation administrator; county clerk; and several lesser known offices, like constables and justice of the peace. Each of these county races are partisan races, which sets their filing deadline for January 9, 2026. The county races will first appear on the ballot on May 19, 2026, for the primary elections.

However, the voters have their own deadline for the primary election. If any voter in Kentucky is looking to change their party affiliation, you must have it completed by December 31, 2025, or else you will not be eligible to vote in any primary election. Even though the process is online and is easier than before, the clerk's office still has to process the change which means it is better to get that done now than to wait until the last minute. To change your party affiliation, you can go to the state's website, Govote. ky.gov, and click on New/Update Registration. From there you can change your party to which it will then go straight through to the clerk's office for processing.

The city races that are on the 2026 ballot are all nonpartisan elections, which carry a later filing date and do not have a primary election. All three cities

within Marshall County which include Calvert, Benton, and Hardin will have mayoral races, along with all six seats on all three city councils. There will also be two board of education districts on the 2026 ballot as nonpartisan races. The office of district judge is also nonpartisan and is set for the 2026 ballot, however, that filing must be completed at the state level rather than locally. The filing date for the nonpartisan races is June 2, 2026. The filing forms can be found online, or can be requested at the clerk's office. They require two signatures from other

party members for partisan races, and two signatures from voters within the relevant district for nonpartisan races. The filing forms are straightforward, but there is an additional registration that many candidates are not aware of. Anybody who runs, no matter what the office is, has to register with KREF and you have to do the quarterly reporting which says how much you've spent and any money that has been donated to you-which is all public record as well

The clerk's office will begin contacting polling locations in January to ensure they will be available on election days, and shortly after they begin preparing the sample ballots, certifying the voting machines, along with other similar tasks. The office does intend to offer early voting again, in a similar manner as the 2024 election was held. If you or someone you know is looking to get involved, but not interested in running for office, the clerk's office is always looking for poll workers. Those looking to help as poll workers, wanting to check their registration. change their party affiliation can do all of those things at govote.kv.gov

PADUCAH, Ky. (WSIL) -- The Kentucky **Transportation Cabinet** (KYTC) has announced ongoing work zone construction and longterm maintenance activities in District 1.

Here is a list of the ongoing projects provided by KYTC...

BALLARD COUNTY

Reduced speed limit on U.S. 60 in Ballard and McCracken counties; 35 and 45 mph in work zones. A temporary diversion is in place near MP 1 on U.S. 60 in McCracken County. Part of the U.S. 60 realignment project near Kevil. The overall estimated completion date is November 7, 2026.

CARLISLE COUNTY

A lane restriction is in effect along U.S. 51 near MP 1.7 just north of Arlington, for the construction of a new bridge. One lane traffic with alternating flow and a 10-foot width restriction. Access to Railroad Street also closed near U.S. 51. Estimated project completion is by April 30, 2026.

KY 1203 is closed at MP 3.09 for a bridge replacement project

over Gray Creek. Estimated project completion is around mid-January, weather permitting.

Crittenden County

KY 387/Dam 50 Road is closed at MP 0.77 for construction of a new Crooked Creek Bridge. This closure will block access to KY 91 for most residents along a 3-mile section of KY 387. Estimated project completion is around mid- to late December, weather permitting.

KY 2123 is closed at MP 1.63 for a bridge replacement project at Caney Fork. This between KY 297 and KY 1668. Estimated project completion is around mid-December, weather permitting.

FULTON COUNTY

KY 94/E. Carroll Street is closed due to a slide near MP 12.7 in the city of Hickman. The roadway is closed to thru traffic.

KY 1128 is closed at MP 6.37 due to the closure of a bridge over Mud Creek. This section of KY 1128 is located between KY 1127 and KY 1212. Estimated project completion is around early to mid-December, weather permitting.

KY 1907/Swamp Root Road is closed at MP



1.727 at the Little Bayou de Chien Bridge. KY 1907 connects KY 94 and KY 781 northeast of the Cayce community.

KY 2140 is closed at MP 3.767 between KY 94 and KY 1129. A bridge replacement project is underway. Estimated project completion is around early December, weather permitting.

KY 1282 is closed at MP 4.741 at the Owens Slough Bridge. This is between KY 311 and KY 925 near the intersection of Joe Parker Road. Estimated project completion is around early to mid-December, weather permitting.

GRAVES COUNTY

KY 1485/Bellville Road is closed at MP 2 at the Terrapin Creek Bridge about two miles north of the KY-TN State Line. Estimated

project completion is by the end of the year.

KY 1748 is closed at MP 0.12 at the Obion Creek Bridge. This section of KY 1748 is located between KY 339 and Oldham Lane, east of Wingo. Estimated project completion is by mid-January, weather permitting.

KY 408 is closed at MP 1.8, just west of KY 339, due to the closure of a bridge over Goose Creek.

KY 1382 is closed at MP 2.85 for a bridge rehabilitation project over Powell Creek. Estimated project completion is around early December, weather permitting.

KY 339 is closed at MP 35.17 due to the closure of a bridge over Brush Creek. This is between western and eastern sections of Shaw Road.

HICKMAN COUNTY

KY 780 is closed at MP 3.818 at the Bayou de Chien Bridge. This is between U.S. 51 and Martin Road. Estimated project completion is around the end of December, weather permitting.

MONEY FOR FARM

KY 123 is closed at MP 0.36 for a bridge replacement project over Little Cypress Creek. Estimated project completion is around early to mid-

December, weather

permitting.

MARSHALL COUNTY

KY 402/Aurora Highway is closed at MP 9.9 (Clarks River Bridge). A bridge replacement project is underway. Estimated project completion is around the end of July

KY 2595/Lakeview Church Road is closed at MP 3.3 for the construction of a new bridge. Estimated project completion is around early December, weather permitting.

MCCRACKEN COUNTY

Lane restrictions are in effect on the Interstate 24 Ohio River Bridge between Paducah and Metropolis. One lane in each direction. Concrete barriers are installed across the length of the bridge with a 10-foot, 6-inch width restriction. Reduced speed limit



"The guys were all excited when I got to Aly," Kelsey said. "They cheered. And I said, 'Okay, here's Aly's line. 11 points, and they all cheered. Six rebounds, and they all cheered. Five assists. The Cards shot 48.4 percent overall (30-62) and 42.4% from distance (14-33) while limiting EMU, which is picked to finish ninth in the Mid-American Conference, to 28.1% (16-57). U of L also scored 20 points off turnovers. The Cards' points came in bunches, including a trio of 12-0 runs.

"I really believe the MAC is a heckuva conference and a couple months from now, we'll look back on this, and this will be a good win, because I think they're going to be a contender in that league," Kelsey said. "They have really good pieces, they're a strong, physical team, and I was proud of our guys. I felt like we met that physical challenge tonight. We knew it was going to be that type of game. 

Exterior decorating safety tips

His grand total of 25,000 lights caused a temporary blackout. While driving around to take in holiday lighting displays, many people may see some that emulate Clark Griswold's vision and be inspired to create their own designs.

Lights are just one type of home decoration. Wreaths, inflatables, metal or wooden structures, and much more are part of holiday displays as well. While decorating can be fun and festive, it's also important to ensure that it is done safely. The following tips, courtesy of Travelers Risk Consultants and Meyer Landscaping & Design, can keep family and friends safe during this wonderful time of year.

• *Plan ahead*. Determine how many

electrical outlets you have and plan

the display around the accessibility of those outlets. Be sure to calculate the maximum amount of wattage allowed so you do not overload the electrical system. Never exceed the maximum number of strings or devices that may be linked together. Lighting packaging should provide such information. Also, plug all outdoor lights and decorations into ground-fault circuit interrupters to reduce the risk of electric shock.

• *Test the lights*. Only purchase lights that have been tested for safety. Look for a certification mark from UL, ETL, CSA, or another nationally


• Go with LED. Light emitting diode string lights run cooler, last longer and use less energy than incandescent lights.

• Use only outdoorrated products.

Be sure the extension cords and any other products are rated for the outdoors. Electrical connections should be kept clean and dry before plugging things in, and an extra step of wrapping plug connections with electrical tape can further reduce moisture.

• Practice ladder safety.

Ladders are often utilized when adding lights or other decor to homes. Always be safe on and around ladders. It's essential to maintain three points of contact while on the ladder. Don't risk leaning too hard to one side while on the ladder, and always have a spotter. Use wooden or fiberglass ladders when

stringing electrical decor and lights, as metal ladders conduct electricity.

• Identify where power lines are located.

Be mindful of power lines when decorating outdoors. Keep oneself and decorations at least 10 feet away from power lines.

• Skip staples and nails.

Nails and staples

should not be used when decorating. Nails and staples can puncture the protective layers of a home, allowing moisture to get in and break down the structure of the home. A nail or staple also may accidentally puncture an electrical cord, increasing the risk of electrocution. Use hooks and other attachment devices specially designed for holiday decor.

• Avoid items that can contribute to roof damage.

Heavy items on the roof can cause unnecessary stress to shingles and result in damage. Only use lightweight and appropriately anchored items on the roof.

• Dress appropriately.

Owensboro Safe Haven Baby Box to close temporarily; other safe-surrender options remain available

The local Safe Haven Baby Box has been temporarily taken out of service as it's relocated to the new Owensboro Fire Department Station 3, and officials say it's crucial for the public to know that several other safe, legal surrender options remain available during the closure.

OFD Chief James Howard said the move is necessary as Station 1, where the box was previously located, is slated to be rebuilt under Operation Firehouse, a multi-year effort to modernize the city's fire stations.

Howard said the department wanted to avoid taking the box offline twice — once during demolition and again to reinstall it elsewhere — so they chose to move it directly to its "forever home" at Station 3 at 2633 Cravens Avenue.

"This is the optimal

time to take the box and install it at that location, to make sure it's installed properly and the communication aspects of it are set up right," Howard said.

Station 3 remains under construction, with crews still needing approximately 3 months to complete interior finishes. Howard said the box will not be activated until firefighters are able to staff the new station.

"You can't have a baby box in service without having 24/7 staffing. That just wouldn't make any sense," he said. "Whenever we move into the station, that's when we will put the box back online."

Because the Owensboro box will be unavailable for several months, temporary signage will be installed at Station 1 directing anyone in need to the nearest Safe Haven Baby Box in Rockport, Indiana. The sign will

also include the Safe Haven hotline and website, along with instructions to call 911 in an emergency.

"A big part of what we're trying to do is to let people know that there are other resources," Howard said. "If you're in a situation where

that's an option you need, there are other baby boxes within a fairly short driving distance."

Howard emphasized that Kentucky's Safe Infants Act still allows parents to legally and anonymously surrender an infant under 30 days old,

even without a baby box.

"Anytime someone's in that situation, by law they can anonymously surrender that infant to a police station, a fire station, the hospital, or even EMS," he said. "Those agencies would take

care of that child and make sure the child is transported to be evaluated properly."

If choosing a faceto-face surrender. Howard stressed that parents need to hand the child directly to personnel rather than leaving them outside.

"Don't leave them at the doorstep like you might see in a movie," he said. "We may not be there, and we want to make sure the child is delivered into a safe environment."

Owensboro's box has never been used since its installation in August 2023, though Howard said staff remain fully trained and that having the option available remains critical.

"At the time that someone needs it, we want to make sure that resource is available," he said. "We want to make sure the best option is available for the person who's in the situation where that is what is necessary to keep that child safe."

"Discipline, teamwork, patience, and goal setting are just both in sports and agriculture. We are pleased to join our partners at the KHSAA to once again honor these

attributes and reward the Commonwealth's best young athletes and agriculturists."

To qualify, studentathletes must be involved in Kentucky agriculture; must participate in one or more KHSAA sports or sport activities during the 2025-2026 school year; must be graduating seniors in high school; and must be accepted to a college, university, or trade school following graduation. An agriculture major is not required, and preference will be given to Kentucky colleges; however, out-of-state schools will be considered if the applicant is seeking a specialized degree in an agricultural field.

Two studentathletes - one male and one female – will be named Outstanding Kentucky Ag Athletes of the Year and will be awarded \$2,000

scholarships. Four student-athletes - two males and two females - will be awarded \$1,000 scholarships as Kentucky Ag Athletes of the Year. Winners will be announced at the 2026 UK HealthCare Boys' Sweet Sixteen in March at Rupp Arena in Lexington.

The scholarships are payable to an institution of higher learning. Funding for the scholarships

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Stadium of Champions to see \$2 million upgrade

HOPKINSVILLE, KY (CHRISTIAN COUNTY NOW) -The Christian County Public Schools Board of Education has moved forward with plans for extensive upgrades at the Stadium of Champions and separate resurfacing of the frequently used practice track. Costs for just the football stadium will be absorbed into the construction budget for the new Christian County High School.

Plans for the stadium include improving the entrance, paving the gravel driveway, relocating fencing, installing new astroturf on the football field, and repaving the track around the field. It is estimated that the renovations at the Stadium of Champions will cost around \$2

This additional cost paired with adjusted expenses changes the scope of the CCHS construction budget to \$141 million. To help counterbalance these costs, the construction budget also saw an incoming revenue increase of nearly \$10 million in grant money and other sources. This budget is separate from the general fund.

Pushback on upgrades, future plans

Board member Lindsey Clark expressed concerns about the necessity of the stadium upgrades due to supposed low attendance at games and infrequent use saying, "We are going from two high schools to one, so we



will spend \$2 million dollars out there to use it six times

Other board members defended the use of the stadium since it is utilized by varsity and junior varsity sports along with the marching band. It was also pointed out that having an upgraded stadium would permit the district to host track meets, which is not possible with the current conditions.

While upgrading the old stadium lights to LED is not in the current plan, Assistant Superintendent Jason Wilson assured them it is on the list for the future.

"I see this as a process at the stadium," said Wilson to the board. "We don't have the ability to go out there right now and do an entire facelift." After a long discussion, the board voted to open up bids for the Stadium of Champion upgrades.

Practice track resurfacing by Gateway Academy

Separate from the Stadium of Champions project and construction of the high school, the board was on the fence about how to address the other deteriorating track that is located behind Gateway Academy. Resurfacing this practice track would cost the district \$203,000 from the general fund. The finishing on this track will not be "competition grade" like the Stadium of Champions, resulting in a lower cost.

Board member Erin Westerfield voiced during the meeting that they should hold off on the repairs and explore other options to provide a usable track for student athletes saying, "It's lasted this long in its pitiful shape, it could last a little longer."

The track was slated to receive maintenance back in 2016, but it was put on the back burner. Since then, the condition of the practice track has continued to decline due to daily use by Christian County middle and high school students, Special Olympics, other private schools, and the general public.

"We could wait, but it will eventually have to be closed off for safety reasons," said Superintendent Chris Bentzel. Despite the pushback, the board approved the cost for the project.

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Drink safely this holiday season

The holiday season is an enjoyable time of year for a variety of reasons. Individuals get to spend time with friends or family members they may

not see very often; gifts are purchased and exchanged; and plenty of delicious foods and beverages are consumed. The holiday season can be



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an indulgent time of year, but most people cast aside the excess in January as they make and heed annual resolutions.

Alcohol tends to be part of holiday indulgence. From mulled ciders to creamy eggnogs to cranberryinfused cocktails to champagne toasts, there are plenty of spirited ways to raise a glass in good cheer. Alcohol, when enjoyed in moderation, can be part of holiday celebrations. However, people must be mindful to consume alcohol safely and responsibly. Here are some tips to avoid getting tipsy this holiday season.

Understand standard drink sizes

Drinks like beer, wine and distilled spirits contain varying amounts of alcohol. Therefore, the "size" of a drink varies depending on one's beverage of choice. The National Association on Alcohol Abuse and

Alcoholism savs a 12-ounce bottle of beer at 5 percent alcohol by volume is one standard drink, as is a fiveounce glass of wine at 12 percent alcohol by volume. Those who enjoy distilled spirits should recognize that a 1.5-ounce shot glass at 40 percent alcohol by volume is a standard drink. The higher the alcohol volume, the smaller the portion size one should have.

Follow the "1-2-3" rule The 1-2-3 rule is a guideline for more responsible drinking. Typically it means having no more than one standard drink per hour, no more than two standard drinks per occasion, and no more than three standard drinks per day. This will help the body to process alcohol safely and prevent binge drinking.

Consider the "20-minute" rule Another guideline for reducing alcohol

consumption is to

pause for 20 minutes after finishing a drink before having another. This allows time to decide if a second drink is truly desired. This strategy, although not scientific in nature nor based on any general guidance on safe moderate drinking recommendations by health experts, simply is a way to drink less by slowing down consumption.

Eat food prior to drinking

Johns Hopkins University notes eating before drinking slows the rate at which alcohol reaches the small intestine. This helps to taper absorption to a pace that the body can handle more effectively. Eating food while drinking alcohol also increases the rate of alcohol elimination from the bloodstream by 25 to 45 percent. Foods that blend a mix of protein, fat and carbohydrates work best for this purpose.

Alternate with water

or seltzer


Drinking still or sparkling water between alcoholic beverages gives the body time to process any alcohol being consumed and helps to prevent dehydration (alcohol is a diuretic). An added bonus is that drinking water between alcoholic drinks slows the rate of consumption.

Skip driving Alcohol affects one's ability to make sound decisions and also impairs reaction times and motor skills. That is why it is essential to have a plan for getting home before consuming alcohol. Taxis, rideshare services and designated drivers are each better means of getting home than driving oneself after consuming alcohol.

Alcohol may play a role in holiday celebrations. Through responsible and safe behavior, the holidays can remain merry.












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Why do the Detroit Lions always play on Thanksgiving?

Households have their own unique Thanksgiving traditions, but one custom common in many homes come Turkey Day involves watching football. Each year on Thanksgiving, the National Football League hosts a handful of games, and it's customary in many households to gather around the television with friends and family and take in some of the action on the gridiron, excitement that always features the Detroit Lions. This unique

tradition has endured for decades, but when did it start? According to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the tradition of the Lions playing on Thanksgiving can be traced to George A. Richards, who purchased the franchise in 1933 when they were the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans. Richards felt competing in a game on Thanksgiving Day would attract Motor City fans who were more devoted to the Detroit Tigers, the city's baseball team. Fans who attended the Lions' first Thanksgiving Day game in 1934 were treated to a nail-biter, with the hometown Lions falling 19-16 to the Chicago Bears at the University of

Detroit Stadium. The Bears had won the league championship the previous year. In a quirk unique to the game in 1934, the two teams locked horns again just three days later, with the Bears


once more emerging victorious in another close contest that ended with a 10-7 score. In the modern era of the NFL, the teams that play on Thanksgiving Day do not play on the following Sunday.

The Mind's Junk Drawer

It taunted me with its rumbling voice. When I walked past it, it assaulted my self-esteem. The clutter-filled junk drawer in our house plagued me every time I opened it—until one day, I couldn't take it anymore. I kicked into high gear and got it looking spick and span. The battle against the unsightly mess was won, but the war was far from over.

Only a week later, its oppression returned with a vengeance. The drawer overflowed

again with loose change, screws. pens, and other I-don't-know-wherethese-go things. And that's when it hit me—I discovered a cleaning hack that revolutionized my life. Namely, the difference between cleanliness and chaos boils down to what you allow to stav. The drawer must either be completely empty or filled with what belongs, so that what doesn't can be thrown away.

A lightbulb went off in my head, and this reminded me of what happens inside my head and yours. Our minds can quickly become junk drawers—filled with cluttering thoughts that do not belong, which breeds spiritual chaos in our lives. The problem is, you can empty a drawer but you cannot empty your mind. You are always thinking about something. The remedy, therefore, is not to flush the mind, but to fill the mind with what belongs so that what doesn't has nowhere to stay.

This is the mental master program Paul gave us in Philippians 4:8: "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." When you fill the drawer of your mind with godly thoughts, then ungodly thoughts have a harder time sticking around. But often, we must clear out the junk before we can fill our minds with sanctifying thoughts. Thus, Paul also taught that the way to eradicate "deceitful desires" is "to be

renewed in the spirit of your minds" (Eph. 4:32).

We must "take every thought captive" to Christ, grabbing hold of wicked thoughts, and throwing them out (2 Cor. 10:5; cf. Jer. 4:14; Isa. 55:7). The Puritan Thomas Brooks compared evil thoughts to unwelcome hotel guests, and counseled, "And like unruly philanderers and rakish revelers, they lodge and party day and night, defiling the rooms they lodge in with their loathsome filth and vomit. These vain, unruly guests must

be kicked out the door without any warning or delay." Certainly, a messy junk drawer doesn't ruin the whole house, but a spiritually cluttered mind will ruin your whole life. Few things are more exigent than getting control of our thought lives, for "as he thinketh in his heart, so is he" (Prov. 23:7). And just as there is peaceful pleasure when opening a clean drawer, the Scripture promises peace to those whose minds are clean: "You keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on you" (Isaiah 26:3a).

In a fog

And then there's the drive to the hunt. Just seeing each turn can sometimes be almost impossible without some type of marker. This is the case at one of my hunting locations. Over the years I have marked a particular turn by a light. While driving down the road this light creates an illusion that it is in the middle of the road. If there's no fog, I can see it for at least a mile away. I simply drive to it and then make the turn. It makes everything easy. When there's a thick fog, this makes it more difficult because now I have to be close to it before I see it. And I have passed

it up a few times. The key is slowing down, locating the light, and heading in the right direction.

Sometimes my life seems like I'm living in a fog. Rarely do my directions seem clear and knowing which way to go is difficult to discern. The problem is just like my attempt at hunting; I sometimes forget to slow down and locate the markers that give me the help I need. I instead complain about uncertainty or God's lack of communication and continue to barrel down the road without adjusting for this fog I'm now in. The truth is, when these conditions show up in my life, I cannot continue to travel as I have been. I must make the necessary adjustments in order that I don't miss the turn I need to take. The light that marks my way is still there. He is as sure and

stable as any marker we might have in our life. But sometimes we must approach slowly, linger longer, and move toward our change of direction with a greater

focus on the turn. Are you living in a fog right now? Have you uttered complaints about the seeming lack of God's guidance? Are you getting ready to make a move even though you are unsure about the direction? Maybe you need to slow down. The light is still there, but in the fog you'll have to draw a little closer before you see it. But when you do, vou'll discover this was precisely the reason for the fog – not to hide His will, but to bring you nearer to the One who gives it.

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10 Interesting Facts About College Basketball

Basketball is not an easy sport — it takes endurance, team spirit and great skills to outscore opponents and win the game. There's more to basketball than just a court, a ball and a referee. Here are some interesting facts you probably don't know about the sport of basketball.

1. James Naismith invented basketball

Asked in 1891 to invent an indoor winter activity by his boss at a YMCA in Springfield, Massachusetts, James Naismith is credited as the founder of basketball. Naismith, a physical education teacher, also wrote the original basketball rule book and founded the University of Kansas basketball program.

2. Basketball was played with a different ball

As bizarre as it sounds, basketball was originally played with a soccer ball and peach baskets, with referees having to retrieve the ball each time a player made a basket. In 1900, the string baskets we know today were introduced to the game and, later, backboards were attached to prevent spectators from blocking a shot.

3. Dribbling wasn't allowed

Players never could advance the ball. Instead, each player had to throw it from wherever he caught it. The first team credited with advancing the ball by dribbling it played at Yale in 1897, and the official allowance for the dribble, just one per possession at first, were adopted four years later.

Another important basketball move, the slam dunk, was banned just before the 1967-1968 season until the 1976-1977 season.

4. More players per side

The number of players per side was never specified.

Naismith invented an indoor winter activity and wanted a game flexible enough to include whoever wanted to play. For a while, the total number of players was a default 18, nine per side, the same number that showed up for the very first game.

5. Fouls played

Shouldering, holding, pushing, tripping or otherwise striking an opponent was never allowed. However, such offenses were never considered fouls until 1910, with the advent of a rule disqualifying a player for committing four of them. That total was raised to five in 1946, in the inaugural rules of the Basketball Association of America (the original name of the National Basketball Association), and to six the next year.

6. Referees used watches

That is because one of the official duties of early refs was timekeeping. Then again, there wasn't that much time to keep: the 24-second shot clock wasn't instituted until 1954, to combat stalling tactics NBA teams had begun to employ.

7. The game was much shorter

Naismith proposed two 15-minute halves, with five minutes of rest in between.

8. The 1979 NCAA tournament was the start of basketball greats

College basketball remains one of the most popular sports, but spectators remember the Michigan State versus Indiana State college basketball game of 1979 during the NCAA tournament, which is one of the best-rated games in the sport's history. As a matchup between Magic Johnson and Larry Bird, who had never played each other prior to this tournament, this game marked the beginning of having basketball greats and NBA stars.

9. Possession rules changed in 1913

The game as we know it gives possession of an out-of-bounds ball to the player who last had contact with it, but that wasn't always the case. Prior to 1913, a referee would pick up and throw an out-of-bounds ball down the court, and the first player to touch it retained possession. The rules eventually changed because of the increase in the number of player injuries.

10. Michael Jordan paid fines for wearing his shoes

You probably connect Michael Jordan with his legendary Air Jordans, a now-iconic shoe because of its record sales numbers. What you may not know is that these shoes used to be against NBA dress code. Michael Jordan paid an NBA fine each time he wore them rather than play the game without them. Eventually, the NBA allowed the shoes on the court.
