Service will commemorate those from
Grant County who died in Vietnam

Lori Goss-Reaves, a state representative for Indiana’s 31st district, is bringing attention to local residents who lost their lives while serving in the Vietnam War. Friday, November 10, at 11 a.m., an event will take place on the lawn of the Marion Municipal Building.

There will be the “Reading of the Names.” Thirty-two men from Grant County were killed in the Vietnam War. The ceremony is in its fourth year.

“At this year’s event our focus will be to tell the stories of some of the men whose names are etched into the monument,” Goss-Reaves said. “By making this an annual event we will eventually be able to focus on everyone so that all of their stories are told.”

If the weather doesn’t

cooperate to meet outside, there is an indoor space that will be used.

“We are planning on an outdoor event but David Slusher, Marion City Maintenance Director, has said each year that if it rains, he will set up the chairs inside,” she said. “So far, we have had good weather every year. David Slusher sets up chairs so that everyone can be seated. There is parking across from the Marion Municipal Building and a few spots right in front. If someone needs dropped off in front of the monument, we will have people available to assist. In the past the event was 30 minutes. We began and ended promptly. This year I have scheduled 45 minutes to allow time for the stories.”

A wide variety of

individuals have participated in the past, from former teachers, classmates, and Gold Star Wives, and many more. Each one has stepped up, whether to read a name of someone they knew, and some tell stories about that person. At this year’s ceremony, colors will be presented by the Marion High School JROTC.

“I continue to hope that more people connected to these men will contact me and ask to read a specific name,” Goss-Reaves said. I choose to organize this event every year because these men deserve to be remembered. Their lives were cut short too soon. “

For Goss-Reaves, this commemoration is personal.

“My dad, Larry Jo Goss was 21 years old when he was killed in

action on the battlefield attempting to save the life of a wounded Marine. My dad was treating 19-year-old PFC Frederick Bungartz in the heat of battle when the NVA threw two grenades that ended the lives of my dad and Frederick. I never wanted my dad to be a hero, I just wanted my dad to come home to my mom and me. In the midst of great danger my dad chose to do what was right because of his character. There is much we can learn from our Vietnam Veterans. Lessons about courage, fear, love of our country, service, freedom, loyalty, determination, and love.

Captain Matt Sneed, from the Grant County Sheriff’s Department has volunteered to research some of the men’s stories.

Matthews café feeds community; Matthews Brownie Company originated at farmers markets

A café that opened in September during the Matthews Covered Bridge Festival is settling in for fall. Matthews Brownie Company café owner, Shannon Holter, is enjoying her expanded workplace located at 717 Massachusetts Avenue in Matthews. Previously, she had been selling her desserts at farmers markets over the past couple of years.

It all started as a project to do with her grandchildren. They experimented with many types of brownies. Now, in addition to her

brownies and other desserts, she offers a variety of foods and has rotating specials. Recently, she has featured chicken and noodles, has served up meatloaf and mashed potatoes, and even offered beef Manhattan.

She and her husband of 23 years, Butch, run the café together. Their building is over 100 years old and was in “bad shape” when they purchased it two years ago. After much work, which they did mostly themselves, they opened for business.

Food preparation has been a part of her life since she was young.

“My earliest cooking memory is making cut-out cookies every Christmas with my Grandma, Mom and sister,” Holter said. “It’s a tradition we continue with our grandchildren. Our soft iced sugar cookies are similar to my grandmother’s cut-out cookie recipe. My uncle Cliff, who is a retired chef has also shared recipes with me.”

“I am an avid food TV watcher and love to try new recipes and techniques,” she continued. “My favorite show is the British baking show. My husband and I also like to watch ‘Diners, Drive-ins and Dives.’ My husband does a lot of the cooking at the restaurant. He is the carb king; making all of our biscuits, noodles and sausage gravy. I make the desserts and soups, and we share making the rest of our breakfast and lunch menu that includes an egg bake, chicken salad, grilled ham and cheese, daily specials and more. Our round brownie is originally topped with chocolate ganache. Kate,

my granddaughter, had the idea to top it with peanut butter ganache instead and the peppermint patty was our first brownie to have a layer between the brownie and the ganache topping. Those first three are still the favorites.

Her husband also is a life-long cook. “His knowledge and love of cooking comes from his helping his mother as a child. We couldn’t do it without my Mom and Dad, Rick and Linda Clock. They are always available to help whether it was with the renovations or now with operations.”

The couple has had a lot of help along the way, including when the first open at the community’s biggest event: The Covered Bridge Festival. “It was very busy,” Holter said. “We were blessed to have the help of a lot of extended family that weekend. My mom is our regular helper and is wonderful at socializing with the customers.”

The café is open Wednesday through Saturday from 7 a.m. to

2 p.m. “We’re expanding our menu all of the time,” she said. “Besides brownies we also have cookies, cheesecake, coffee. Cake and other baked goods. We also have great hot and iced coffee. We added bacon and potatoes to our breakfast menu recently.”

All of it’s a labor of love to them.

She said “The work is hard, and hours are long, but the people are great! Visiting with new and old friends and getting

to see people enjoy each other’s company is the ganache on the brownie!”

Good life and longevity

Can we explain what we believe?

The foundation of the Christian faith, along with the hope of eternal salvation in the next life, is based on the torturous death and glorified resurrection of the only perfect individual we know as Jesus Christ. When we trust that His sacrificial blood is the only payment for our forgiveness and our hope for redemption, we become reborn, a new spiritual creation within His family and kingdom. Do you believe that trusting in this God-man is the greatest demonstration of love the world has ever known? Since this miraculous event happened over 2000 years ago, do you know why you believe these promises are true? Let’s go a little further. Have you ever had a life-changing encounter with the

person called the Son of God? Did you know that just believing there is a God, or that Jesus is real, is NOT the same thing as giving all of your heart, mind, and soul to Him? Pastors are not the only ones who are called to explain and teach God’s word; every person who has invited Christ to be their Lord and Savior should spend every available moment focusing on Him and getting to know Him more intimately through prayer and study. This is how His children become His fearless, wise, mighty, and overcoming warriors. Over the last 100 years, the number of people interested in researching the Bible has increased. I’m not referring to those who want to draw closer to God, but rather the progressive intellectual critics who try to

refute and disprove what is written. These are not your casual readers who accept what someone says on the surface or are satisfied with the idea of just believing by faith. Similar to how those who must prove everything according to science, these individuals are intense and seek more difficult answers than are discussed in church classes. In fact, if one of these agnostics were to present their views in church, most would be considered a heretic or worse. I have several friends around the country, and we have interesting discussions about God and the Bible. As I mentioned, we have many questions about Christianity that are often left to speculation. I’ve read some of the textual critics who take pride in being able to pin a preacher

against the wall who has been in Christian leadership most of his life. I’m writing this small article not to discourage you who are followers of Christ, but to blow the trumpet of warning about how important it is to know what we believe. Especially in the last 60 years, while the nominal Christians have been spiritually asleep, these scholars have been hard at work trying to see if what the text says is actually correct. I know that many will say, That’s a huge waste of time and is offensive to those who trust God, but how can we condemn those who have sincerely given their lives to researching every jot and tittle of the Bible? It’s one thing to know what something says, and it’s another thing to explain what it means. This is true with the Bible, as

there are individuals who have memorized what is written, but do they know how to translate the original languages into our modern English? For example, I’m not saying that I agree with what Bart Ehrman teaches, but he is recognized as a highly respected Biblical scholar who focuses on the textual criticism of the New Testament, the historical Jesus, and the origins and development of early Christianity. For anyone to debate him on Biblical topics, they would need to bring their A-game of theological research, and not just answers like, “I believe this because that’s what my grandmother said.” My point is that all Christians should not only stand for their convictions, but have the ability to prove why they accept and trust

them. The reason why all Christians are not dedicated theologians is that it’s much easier to accept a meal than to cook one. Most people say I do not have time to study the Bible, while spending several hours a day watching TV and playing on their phones. I encourage every follower to take a scholarly approach to understanding religious texts, including their faith-based views so they can be instant in season and out of season to give an answer. II Timothy 2:15 is not only about gaining knowledge, it’s taking the time to rightly divide His word and be enlightened by God’s divine revelation. Repairing the rusting russet-colored sedan seemed like a waste of time to me. If you searched for “clunker” in Webster’s Dictionary, you’d see a picture of this car. It was in terrible shape: the tires were ashy from wear, the paint was chipped from weather, and the engine sputtered from sitting idle for so long. Despite its sorry state, it was my father’s restoration project for a few weeks. He took a hunk of junk, and burned time, broke sweat, and battered tools to make it run like new. Likewise, you are the heavenly Father’s “restoration project” if you have been saved by grace. The Scripture says, “For we are His workmanship” (Eph. 2:10a). The Lord bought you from sin’s junkyard, and He is always working

on you to make you run like new (cf. Eph. 4:22-24; Col. 3:9-10). You are in His workshop of sanctification, but not for self-improvement. God is working on you to make you more like Christ: “And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another. For this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit” (2 Cor. 3:18). Like any good mechanic, the Father uses many tools to fix you up. The Bible is a hammer that God uses to flatten out the dents in your theology (Jer. 23:29). The local church is the place where God gives you a weekly “engine tune up” in order to run effectively for Him throughout the week. Trials and tribulations are the buff pads God uses to polish the scuffs on your faith (James 1:2-4). And prayer is the “jump” that cranks your engine for righteous

living, since it is through prayer that we receive God’s own power to obey Him (James 5:16). God isn’t finished with you yet, but He will finish what He started. The Scripture assures us, “And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ” (Phil. 1:6). Sometimes in deer hunting, the tree stand becomes the seat of discontentment. Early in my hunting life, I was notorious for giving up on one spot for the hopes of another. My logic was always based upon the deer that I was not seeing. It didn’t matter that I had spent weeks or even months scouting that particular area. I was willing to give up after only a few days of inactivity. And since these were the days before trail cameras, my roaming always seemed justified. Sometimes I would get out of the tree stand and just start wandering around. I called it spotting and stalking, but it was really my inability to be patient with where I was. My cry was, “If I could only see deer! I don’t have to shoot one; I just want to see movement.” So, after a couple of non-

productive days, I was ready to move on. The problem was that many times the new place I found was no better than the last. So, I moved again. Now, as you can see, I began forming a pattern of constantly moving; and worse, a pattern of impatience. Thankfully, as I grew older, I overcame the urge to move. I began to trust my pre-season scouting and realized that my constant moving was not caused by the lack of deer movement but by something lacking within me. What was lacking was problems, or as the Bible says, tribulation. Here’s what it says. “We also glory in tribulations, knowing that tribulation produces perseverance.” In deer terms this means that when I realized that deer was showing up at the place I had just moved from; I understood that I had moved too soon. My tribulation of the

past produced in me the patience I need today. Right now, you may be getting a little antsy as well. The urge to move may be welling up inside you. It may be coming from unrealized expectations or delayed activity. But don’t be so quick to leave. You may only be moving toward a pattern of impatience while someone else is enjoying the fruit of being at the place you just left. 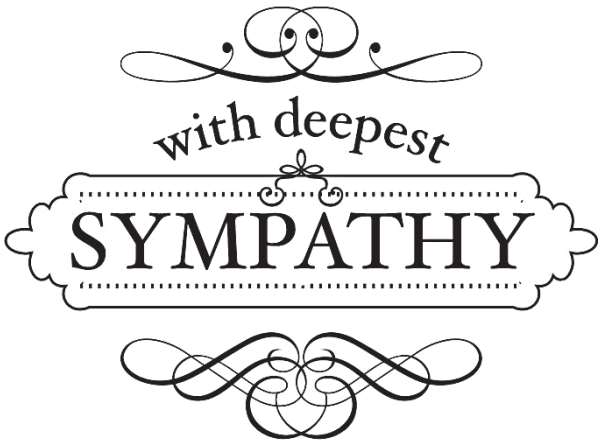

The many reasons to support local journalism

Many adults can likely recall mornings during their childhood when newspapers were tossed into the driveways of many homes throughout their neighborhoods. Some adults might even have delivered papers from their bicycles each morning.

Such scenes may now be a relic of the past, thanks in large part to wide reliance

on the Internet as a source for news. But the benefits of reading a daily newspaper are no less substantial today than they were when enterprising youngsters could be seen tossing newspapers into driveways in neighborhoods across the nation in the wee hours of the morning. In fact, the American Journalism Project

reports that the loss of local news is adversely affecting democracy by contributing to polarization, a decline in voting participation and less government accountability. Readers concerned by such a report can take note of the following reasons why it’s so vital to support local journalism.

- Local newspapers drive political engagement, particularly among younger voters. Young people are often characterized as the future of the nation, and that’s one notable reason to support local journalism. According to the CIRCLE/Tisch College Post-Election Poll conducted between November 3 and December 2, 2020, 50 percent of youth reported feeling more prepared to vote in the 2020 elections thanks

to local news media. Local journalism can contribute to a more knowledgeable and engaged electorate, which is an invaluable benefit at a time of waning voter participation and reduced accountability of government.

- Local journalism helps build communities. Community-building is another benefit of strong local journalism. In their book, News Hole: The Demise of Local Journalism and Political Engagement, authors Danny Hayes and Jennifer Lawless connect a decline in local news with decreased participation in local elections. When voters participate less in local elections, they’re less likely to learn about issues affecting their communities, whereas greater voter

participation increases civic engagement and helps to build stronger communities.

- Local journalism keeps people up-to-date on their own communities. Cable news networks and their affiliated websites primarily focus on national and international news, leaving viewers and readers who rely exclusively on these mediums for their news with little or no access to information regarding issues affecting their own communities. Local newspapers have long filled that void, providing an invaluable benefit and a means for readers to learn what’s being done and what can be done about issues affecting their daily lives and the communities they call home.
- Local journalism

holds local government officials accountable. In early 2025, the Richmond (CA) City Council voted to give themselves 80 percent increases in their monthly salaries. Though the merits of those increases were open to debate from both sides, chances are strong Richmond residents might not have learned about the salary adjustments had it not been for local journalists’ reporting. The Richmond example underscores the vital role local journalism plays in relation to keeping an eye on local governments and holding them accountable.

Local journalism is vital to a thriving democracy, and readers are urged to support the many local newspapers working hard to keep their communities well-informed.

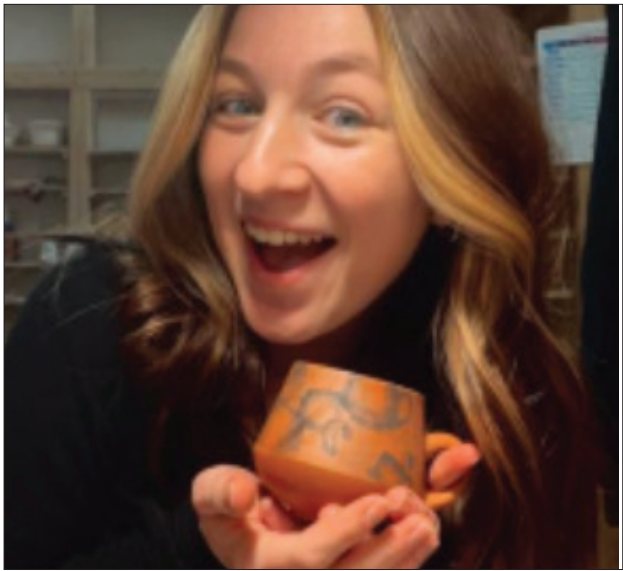

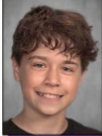

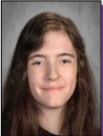
