## MCHS Graduate Accepted to Air Force Academy

are accepted into the United States Air Force Academy each year out of more than ten thousand applications. This prestigious appointment equates to more than six hundred thousand dollars, including a four year, full-ride scholarship with intensive military and leadership training.

To earn an appointment, students must demonstrate strong performance in rigorous academics, physical fitness, leadership, and service. They must also secure a nomination from a member of Congress or another authorized nominating source.

Those who are selected, choose to attend, and ultimately graduate from the Academy will earn a Bachelor of Science degree and receive a commission as an officer in the United States Air Force or United States Space Force.

Rohrer calls the appointment "an honor" and something he has wanted for a long time. Rohrer says he wrote a letter when he was in the 8th grade indicating his desire to become an Air Force Officer and a pilot. Now that dream is closer to becoming a reality.

Upon successful completion of the military, academic, and athletic rigors

of the United States Air Force Academy, cadets graduate not only with their Bachelor of Science but commission as an officer in the United States Air Force or United States Space Force where they will serve in one of over 40 officer career fields, spanning from engineer to security forces, cyber operations to space intelligence, public affairs to pilot. Rohrer plans to pursue a degree in aeronautical engineering and become a pilot.

At Marshall County High School, Rohrer was on the golf team and was a member of the National Honor Society, FBLA and FCA.

Marty Brown is a Kentucky-born country music singer-songwriter known for his traditional country sound, heartfelt storytelling, and nationally recognized songwriting career. in the 1990s and writing songs for artists such as Tracy Byrd and Brooks & Dunn, Brown gained a new generation of fans through his memorable appearance on America's Got Talent in 2013. Today, he continues to perform across the country, proudly representing his Kentucky roots and classic country music traditions.

He hits the stage at 7:00 PM. More of the lineup will be released at a later date.

# AG UPDATE Simple strategies to control mosquitoes

Mosquitos can ruin outdoor activities in the warmer months. It may seem like a never-ending battle when you're fighting to control the pesky insects. With mosquito-borne diseases becoming more prevalent, it's even more important to know how to take control of these pests around your home. Learning to do a few simple things could help protect you from more than the itchiness of a mosquito bite.

All mosquitos need standing water to develop through their larval stages, and that doesn't necessarily mean a lake or pond. It also includes bird baths, kiddie pools and even discarded soda pop cans. The key to controlling them around your home is to stop them



from breeding in the first place.

Some things you can do include:

- Drain and remove trash, bottles and

any debris that holds water.

- Recycle any unused containers that could collect water, especially old tires.

- Change water weekly in bird baths, wading pools, watering troughs and animal bowls.
- Fill in holes, de-

pressions and puddles in your yard.

- Make sure your culverts and ditches are draining properly.
- Check and clean

out clogged gutters to ensure drainage.

- Keep ornamental ponds stocked with fish.
- Fix leaky hoses and faucets.
- Drain water from flowerpots and garden containers.
- Turn over wheelbarrows, buckets and other items that collect water.
- Adjust tarps covering woodpiles, boats and grills to remove standing water.
- Encourage natural enemies of mosquitoes, such as warblers, swallows, martins and other insect-feeding birds.

It's a good idea to start these practices early in the season. Just because the mosquitoes aren't biting yet, it doesn't mean that they're not developing.

# Host Families Needed for International Exchange Students

Families across Western Kentucky have the opportunity to make a lasting impact by hosting an international exchange student through Cultural Homestay International (CHI).

Students ages 15-18 from countries including Brazil, Belgium, Japan, Italy, France, Turkey, Thailand, Germany, Mongolia and Spain are currently looking for welcoming homes for the upcoming school year. CHI places students throughout Western Kentucky, including Ballard, Carlisle, Graves, Mayfield, Hickman and surrounding school districts.

Host families provide a bed, meals at home, some transpor-

tation and a welcoming environment. Students come with their own health insurance and spending money for personal expenses, activities and school-related costs.

Families do not have to have children of their own to host, and singles are also welcome. Host families can choose a student by reviewing detailed profiles, letters, photos and videos submitted by the students. Completing the application process to view students is quick and does not commit a family to hosting.

One student currently needing a home is Henrique, a one-semester student who will be here from August through December. Henrique says he loves “all sports with



a ball,” making him a great fit for an active family or sports-loving community like Ballard County.

Jessica Cooper, local coordinator for CHI, said hosting has been a rewarding expe-

rience for her own family.

“I have been hosting for three years and have already committed to a student for next year as well,” Cooper said. “My family loves the kids we

have hosted, and we have gained so much from the experience.”

CHI also offers support throughout the year, with coordinators staying in contact monthly with both the student and host

family.

# Gov. Beshear expands medical cannabis access for 15 conditions in Kentucky

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Kentucky Gov. Andy Beshear has announced an expansion of the state’s medical cannabis program, allowing patients with 15 additional medical conditions to qualify for treatment under the law.

The move is intended to broaden access for Kentuckians suffering from chronic and debilitating health issues while the state continues to implement its medical cannabis program. Beshear said the decision was based on recommendations from

medical experts and public input regarding conditions that may benefit from cannabis treatment.

Under the expansion, patients diagnosed with the newly approved conditions will be eligible to seek certification from authorized healthcare practitioners. Officials say the change is expected to provide relief options for thousands of residents who previously did not meet the program’s eligibility requirements.

“This is about helping people who are living with serious medical challenges,” Beshear said in a



statement. “Kentuckians deserve access to treatments that may improve their quality of life when recommended by their healthcare providers.”

Supporters of the expansion praised the decision, arguing that medical cannabis can offer an alter-

native to traditional medications for some patients. Advocacy groups said the broader eligibility criteria will make the program more accessible and responsive to patient needs.

Critics, however, have called for continued monitoring of the

program’s implementation, emphasizing the importance of physician oversight and patient safety. State officials said regulations governing cultivation, distribution, and patient access will remain in place as the program grows.

Kentucky legalized medical cannabis in 2023, with the program designed to provide regulated access for patients with qualifying conditions. The latest expansion marks one of the most significant updates since the law was enacted.

Health officials encourage patients interested in medical cannabis to consult with their healthcare

providers and review state guidelines to determine eligibility. The expanded list of qualifying conditions is expected to take effect as the state continues rolling out medical cannabis services across Kentucky.

The newly recognized qualifying conditions include:

- Terminal illness
- Sickle cell anemia
- ALS (Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis)
- Parkinson’s disease
- HIV and AIDS
- Huntington’s disease
- Muscular dystrophy
- Cachexia or wasting syndrome
- Crohn’s disease
- Ulcerative colitis
- Neuropathies
- Severe arthritis
- Fibromyalgia
- Glaucoma

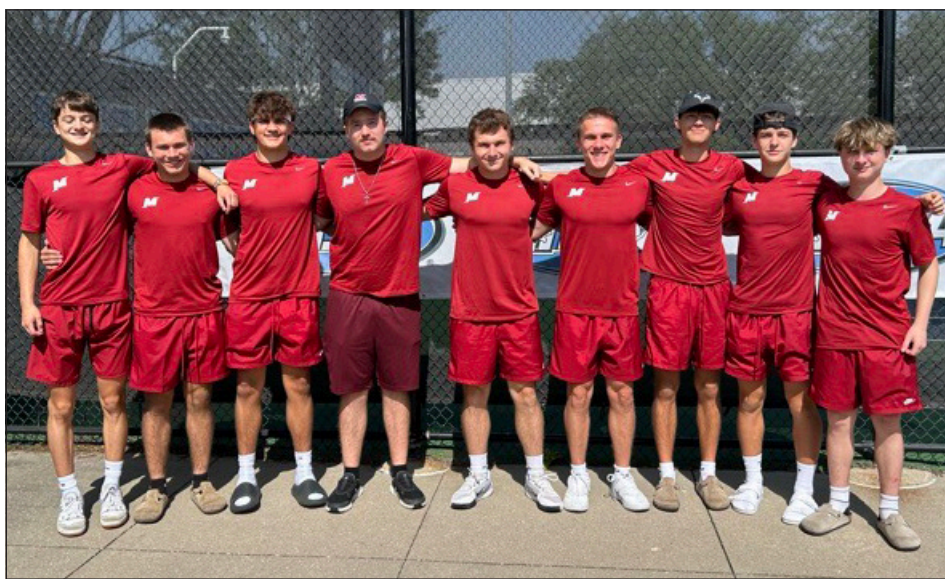

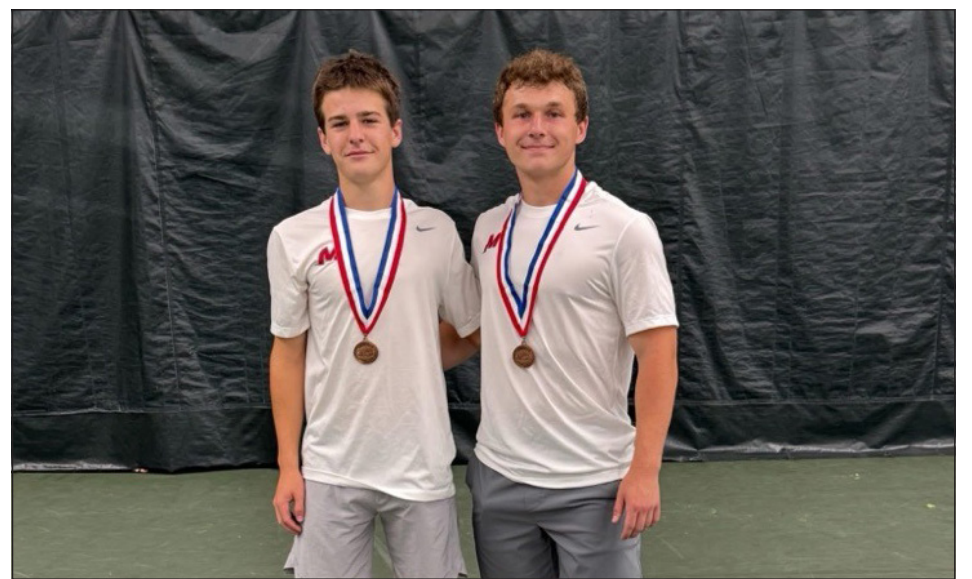

For those with more experience, visit the department’s main Fishing landing



page for links to all fishing topics.

**Get equipped:** Fishing poles can be purchased inexpensively at sporting goods and box stores, second-hand stores and yard sales. Fishing poles can also be borrowed for free at a number of locations across the state. Search for nearby locations on the Loaner Fishing Pole Locations map on the department’s website.

**Learn the rules:** See the annual Kentucky Fishing & Boating Guide, also in a Spanish language version, for a complete summary of all fishing regulations.

**Where to go:** Visit the Fishing in Neighborhoods (FINs) webpage for lists of easily accessible, specially stocked lakes. For a comprehensive list of fishing and boating access sites across Kentucky, check out the Waterbodies Search webpage.

**Get inside information:** Peruse the

annual fishing forecast and tipswebpage for insider information on fish around the state.

**Find fish:** Search the Lakes with Fish Attractors webpage for habitat maps at various lakes and download GPX files from there.

**Continue learning:** Kentucky Fish and Wildlife hosts Hook and Cookclasses in a number of communities throughout the year. Look for one- and two-day classes to improve or learn new skills.

For anglers on the go, download and use Kentucky’s Fish Boat KY app. The app helps users to find directions to local lakes, read fishing reports, learn about regulations, find stocking schedules, locate the nearest boat ramp and more. The app is available in the iTunes and Google Play app stores.

The water is calling. Pack up the family on the first weekend of June and enjoy fishing in Kentucky – for free.

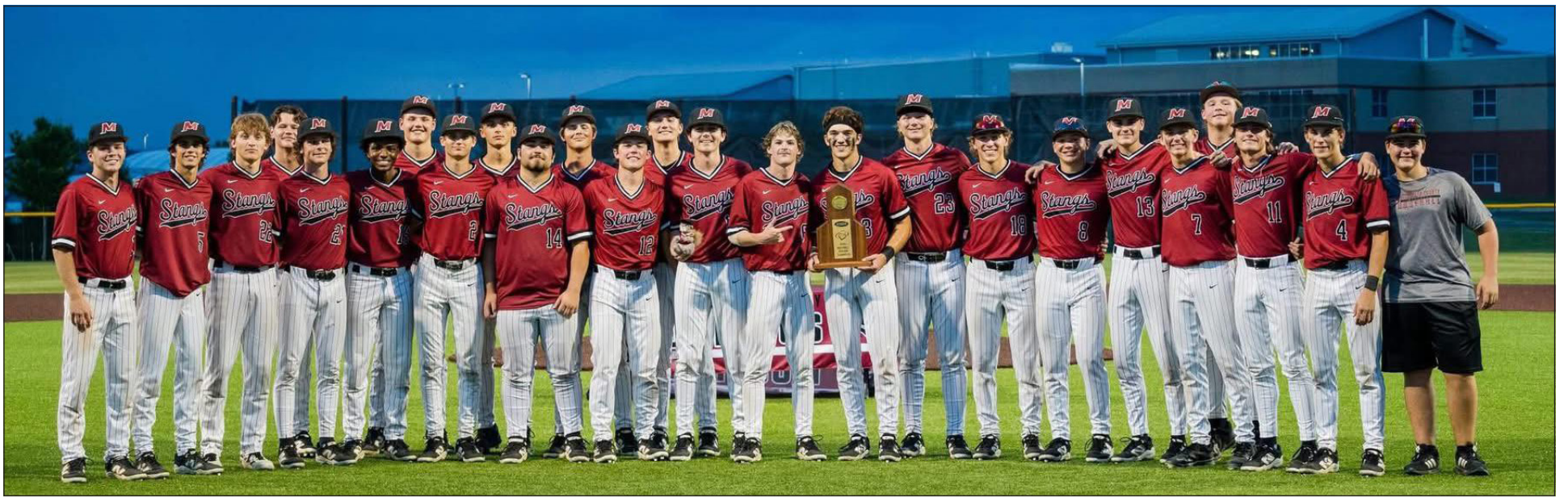

# Murray State Athletics records highest finish in MVC All-Sports Trophy Standings

MURRAY — Murray State Athletics was rewarded for one of its most holistically competitive years in program history after it was announced that the Racers finished second in the Missouri Valley Conference's All-Sports Trophy final standings. The second-place finish is the department's best since joining the MVC. The Racers secured the second spot with a final score average of 8.814 after winning three total championships in league play throughout the 2025-26 athletics campaign. "This year has represented one of the most successful and athletically-competitive chapters in the history of our university," Murray State

University President Dr. Ron Patterson said. "Our student-athletes, coaches and staff have embraced a culture centered on excellence. We are incredibly proud of the momentum surrounding our university as we continue leading the pack and building an even brighter future for Murray State." Murray State earned regular-season and tournament titles in women's basketball and also won the women's golf championship. MSU also recorded top-three finishes in women's soccer, softball, women's tennis, baseball, and men's golf, while men's basketball, women's cross country and women's track and field picked up top-four finishes. "This has been

the most athletically-competitive year in the history of our department because our student-athletes, coaches and staff have embraced a championship mentality in everything that we do," Director of Athletics Nico Yantko said. "A major pillar of our strategic priorities is competing for and winning championships, and we achieved that this year with nine of our programs recording top-four finishes and women's basketball and women's golf winning league titles. We are incredibly proud of the relentless drive that continues to push our department forward while we focus on leading the pack, and we know that the best is yet to come."

Since joining in the league in 2022-23, the Racers' best finished in the All-Sports Trophy standings prior to this season was seventh place. Over the last two years, Murray State has raised a school-record \$43 million dollars in support of new facilities, initiatives and championship resources. That total was made possible by 15, seven-figure gifts, which also amounts to the most in department history. The \$43 million is committed towards the department's bold, comprehensive \$100 million fundraising campaign, Leading The Pack, which was created to further position itself for the future by investing in student-athlete suc-

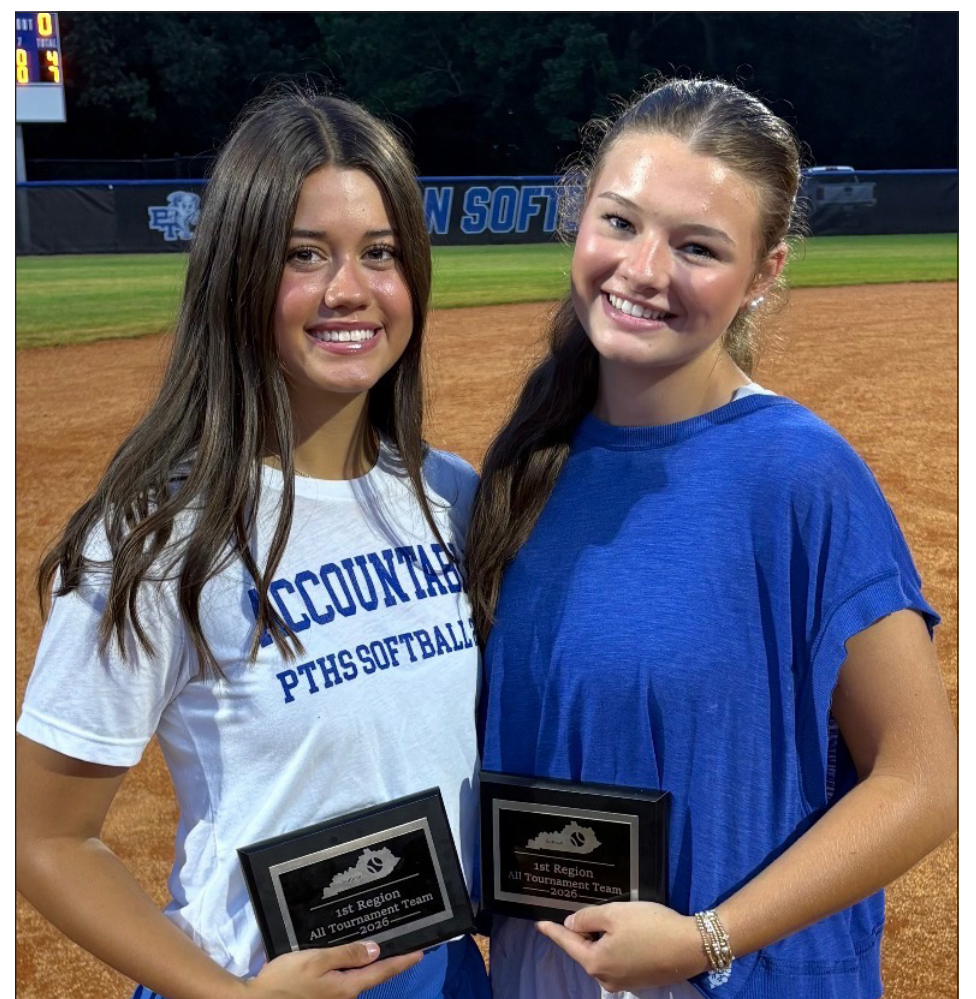
cess and wellness, revenue share and competitive resources and world-class facilities. The All-Sports Trophy is based on a school's average finish in each of the sponsored championships by the Missouri Valley Conference. Teams are awarded 12 points for first, 11 for second, 10 for third, etc., and the total accumulated points are divided by the number of sports in which a particular school competes. For sports not sponsored by every MVC school, the points decrease by the number of competing schools (i.e., in a sport where 10 teams compete, 12/10 = 1.20, so point totals decrease by 1.20; 1st = 12, 2nd = 10.8, 3rd = 9.6, etc.) Finishes in baseball, basketball, soccer,

softball, tennis, and volleyball are based on regular-season competition. However, institutions receive three bonus points for each league post-season championship earned in those aforementioned sports. All other sports are determined by finish at the championship tournament or championship meet.

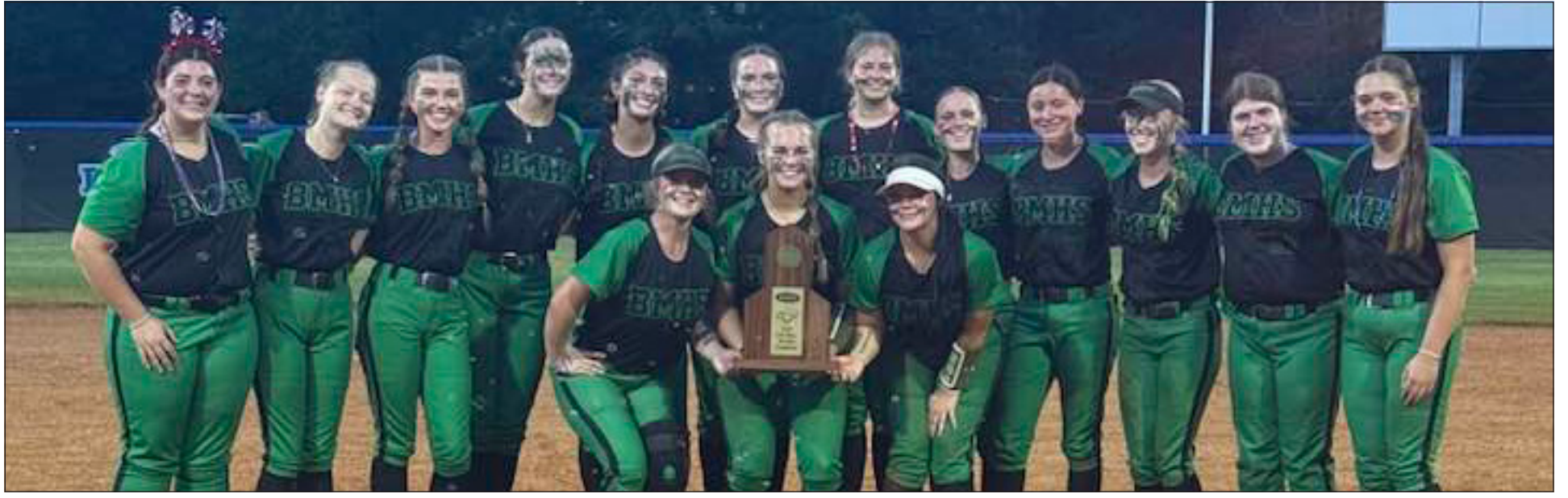

Following Byassee, Keeleigh Stewart pitched the last four innings in relief for the Lady Falcons. Stewart recorded four strikeouts.

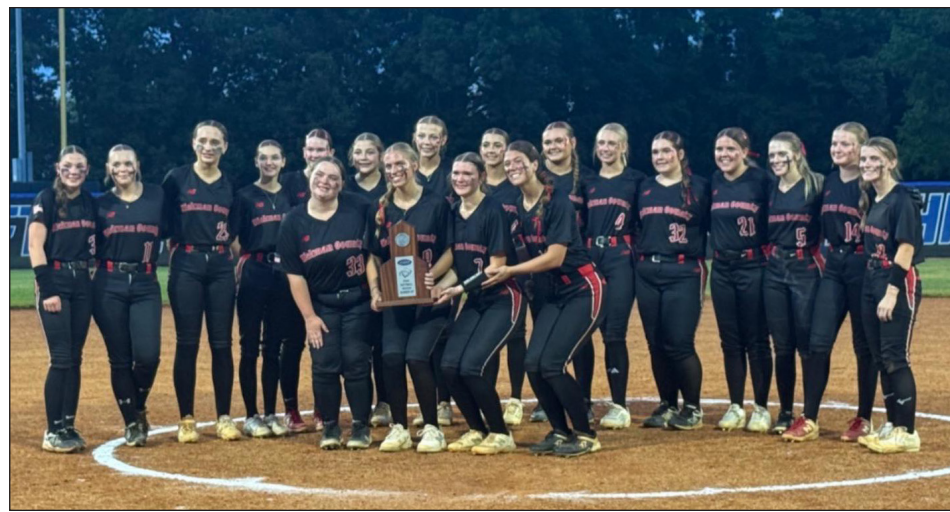

## KHSAA Dead Period slated for June 25-July 9

PADUCAH — Student-athletes will be sidelined June 25-July 9 via the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Dead Period.

The Dead Period was adopted 20-plus years ago by member schools in response to concerns about year-round play and practice and parental and coaching desire for some down time from interscholastic play. Member schools adopted the period of June 25-July 9 as a time of inactivity, which followed the pattern of the historic idling of southern textile mills

and this time allows administrators, coaches, student-athletes and their families a time where they are not committed to school play.

According to Article 3 of Bylaw 26 (The Dead Period), it states that: "Students may not receive coaching or training from school personnel (either salaried or non-salaried) and school facilities, uniforms, nicknames, transportation or equipment shall not be used each year in any KHSAA-sanctioned sport or cheerleading squad during the period beginning June 25 and going through July 9.

School funds may not be expended in support of interscholastic athletics in any KHSAA sanctioned sport during this period. These restrictions shall not apply to any postseason wrap-up activities, celebrations and recognition events relating to a spring sports team at a school which participated in KHSAA state championship play in that particular sport during that particular year."

Fall sports teams will open preseason practices in July, following the conclusion of the KHSAA Dead Period.

## Kentucky Lands Transfer Forward Milan Momcilovic

The addition is viewed as a significant recruiting win for the Wildcats, who have emphasized adding experienced talent through the transfer portal. Momcilovic averaged double figures in scoring during his collegiate career and earned recognition for his perimeter shooting and basketball IQ.

With his commitment secured, Kentucky continues to build a roster capable of competing for SEC and national championships.



# CN Train Derails in Hickman County; No Injuries Reported

HICKMAN COUNTY, Ky. — Recovery efforts are ongoing after a CN Railroad freight train derailed late Sunday night near the Hickman County–Carlisle County line, leaving approximately 30 railcars and two locomotives off the tracks in a heavily wooded area near Peery Road.

According to the Hickman County Emergency Management Agency, officials were notified of the possible derailment at approximately 10:16 p.m. on May 31. The train was carrying a mixed freight load that included aggre-

gate materials, automotive-related cargo and various non-hazardous chemical products.

Emergency responders initially identified two railcars as potential hazardous materials concerns. However, hazardous materials specialists and CN Railroad officials later determined the railcars posed no threat to public safety. As a result, a shelter-in-place advisory issued for nearby residents in northern Hickman County was lifted Monday morning.

CN Railroad said the derailment occurred after the train struck a tree that had



fallen onto the tracks. The collision caused 31 railcars to derail in various positions, including two locomotives.

“There were no injuries, fires or impact to the public,” CN said in a statement. The company confirmed that one railcar carrying carbon dioxide was ruptured and that fuel leaked from one locomotive into a nearby waterway. Environmental response teams have been deployed and officials said the affected areas have been contained.

Despite the derailment, authorities emphasized that no injuries have been reported and there is currently no threat to surrounding communities.

The incident has disrupted rail travel. Amtrak announced

that its City of New Orleans trains 58 and 59 are temporarily terminating and originating in Carbondale, Illinois, with no alternate transportation available.

Peery Road remains closed indefinitely, and Highway 51 North between KY 288 and KY 80 in Arlington continues to experience traffic delays due to emergency response operations.

Multiple local, regional and state agencies remain on scene assisting with recovery, environmental remediation and traffic management efforts. Investigations into the derailment continue.

## Marshall County Launches Registry to Help First Responders Better Serve Residents with Autism

(BENTON, Ky.) — Marshall County Emergency Management has launched a new voluntary registry program aimed at improving emergency response for residents with Autism Spectrum Disorder and related developmental conditions.  
The Community

ASD Voluntary Registry Program allows parents, guardians, caregivers, and individuals to submit information — such as communication preferences, sensory sensitivities, and calming techniques — that first responders can access when called to an emergency involving a registered individual.  
"Together, we can

build a safer and more informed community for everyone," MCEM Director Curt Curtner said in announcing the program.  
Emergency personnel would be able to use the registry in a range of situations, including missing person incidents, de-escalation during high-stress encounters, and any call where understanding a

person's behavioral or medical needs could improve outcomes. Responders would also be alerted in advance to sensitivities such as reactions to flashing lights or sirens — common features of emergency scenes that can be particularly distressing for individuals on the autism spectrum.  
County officials emphasized that

participation is entirely voluntary and that submitted information will remain confidential, accessible only to authorized emergency response personnel for emergency purposes.

# After long wait, joy in Kentucky as Momcilovic chooses Wildcats

LEXINGTON, Ky. (KT) – Kentucky got its man, finally.

Milan Momcilovic, the top available player remaining in the portal, chose UK over Louisville and Arizona on Monday night, according to multiple sources.

The 6-foot-8 Momcilovic played for Iowa State last season where he led college basketball in three-pointing shooting with a 48.7 percentage on 7.5 attempts per game. His coming vaults UK back into the position of nation-

al contender under Mark Pope, who enters season three as the head coach.

Momcilovic told the Lexington Herald-Leader last month that Kentucky would be in the mix for his talents.

“I think Kentucky would be a good fit,” Momcilovic told the newspaper. “I obviously went against Pope at BYU his first year (in the Big 12), and I loved how his team played. I think we went 1-1 against them, but they killed us at their place, because they fly the ball up the court and shoot 3s. I really like the way they play.”

Momcilovic’s style fits Kentucky perfectly with his ability to shoot from beyond the perimeter.

“Kentucky last year, he didn’t have enough shooters around him to really coach, I feel like, the way he wanted,” he said at the time. “But I think — if I were to choose Kentucky — that would be a good fit for me. I feel like I’d be a great player for him, and he’d be a good coach for me.”

He went through the NBA Combine but eventually pulled out of the NBA Draft late last Wednesday. Since then UK fans - and others - have

been on edge about when he was going to make his college choice. It finally came Monday night and Big Blue Nation could finally exhale.

Momcilovic, who is from Pewaukee, Wisconsin, scored 1,349 points over his three years at Iowa State. He averaged 16.9 points per game last season.

Kentucky’s season ended with a loss to Momcilovic’s Iowa State team in the second round of the NCAA tournament. The Wildcats were 22-14 after starting the season ranked ninth in the AP Top 25.

Iowa State coach T.J. Otzelberger said he had no hard feelings regarding Momcilovic’s future choices last month.

“I love Milan. Like, he’s my guy,” he said. “Obviously, we had a couple of years’ relationship prior to him even coming to Iowa State, and I think what you want for everybody in your program is for their dreams to become a reality. And, obviously, with the season he had and how he’s continued to develop, he put himself in a great position for the draft.

“And yet, at the

same time, in the climate and the landscape of college athletics, it’s important to keep your options open and leave that available at the end if it isn’t to go your way. So, everything, all the conversations were great. I really respect how he went through and made his decisions, and I don’t think there’s anybody who’s a loser in this situation, right? We had a great experience with him for three seasons ... it’s important that he’s able to find a landing spot at a college that fits what he’s looking for.”

# Search Ends in Tragedy as Missing Owensboro Teen Found in Kentucky Lake

LYON COUNTY, Ky. — An 18-year-old Owensboro resident died following a cliff-jumping accident at Kentucky Lake over the weekend, according to local emergency officials.

Marshall County Emergency Management Agency Director Curt Curtner said emergency crews recovered the body of Caleb Milem, 18, at approximately 12:57 p.m. Monday after an extensive search that began Sunday afternoon near the Rock Quarry area of Ken-

tucky Lake.

According to Curtner, Milem was jumping from cliffs that rise roughly 50 feet above the water when the incident occurred. The area is a popular destination during the summer, with visitors frequently leaping from the cliffs into the lake below.

Investigators believe Milem was performing flips while jumping from the cliffs. Curtner said evidence gathered during the investigation suggests Milem landed face-first and stomach-first on his final jump.

“It appears that the



last time he did it, he sort of landed on his face and belly,” Curtner said. “It probably knocked him unconscious and knocked the breath out of him.”

Search efforts were suspended Sunday night due to limited visibility and resumed Monday morning after specialized equipment capable of reaching deeper water

was brought to the scene. Officials eventually located Milem approximately 95 feet below the lake’s surface.

Curtner emphasized that investigators do not believe Milem struck any underwater rocks. He explained that the cliff face extends outward as it descends, allowing jumpers to clear the rock wall when entering the water.

While tragic, Curtner noted that fatal accidents at the site have been relatively rare over the past three decades.

Multiple agencies

assisted in the search and recovery operation, including emergency management and rescue teams from Marshall, Lyon, McCracken, and Caldwell counties, along with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife, TVA Police, and Christian Area Ministries.

Milem’s body was released to the Marshall County Coroner’s Office and is expected to undergo an autopsy in Frankfort. Funeral arrangements are expected to be announced in the coming days.

## 12 counties randomly chosen for election audit

FRANKFORT, Ky. (KT) – Attorney General Russell Coleman announced he randomly selected 12 Kentucky counties on Tuesday afternoon that will be undergoing an inquiry following the May 2026 Primary Election.

The inquiries will be conducted by members of the Attorney General’s Department of Criminal Investigations (DCI) to determine if any irregular-

ities took place during the primary election.

The 12 counties that were selected, in order of their drawing from a small bourbon barrel by Coleman, were: Rowan, Oldham, Franklin, Daviess, Laurel, Adair, Scott, Union, Fulton, Carroll, Floyd, and Pike. The length of time each audit will take varies by the population and number of ballots cast in each of the counties.

State law used to provide for six counties (or five percent of



Kentucky’s 120 counties) to be randomly selected for post-election audits after each primary and general

election, but the Kentucky General Assembly doubled that number a few years ago.

“From Pike to Fulton, our Office is committed to ensuring Kentucky’s elections are free, fair, and secure,” Coleman said. “Along with our election officials and law enforcement partners, we are committed to making sure every vote is counted fairly.”

The Attorney General’s office monitors potential election law violations throughout the year through the Election Fraud Hotline. Since January 1, the Hotline received

nearly 600 messages, including 155 on Election Day. Coleman noted that all but two complaints were unfounded, and those two remain under investigation by the DCI.

After completing independent investigations involving each of the 12 counties selected, DCI investigators and the Attorney General’s Special Prosecutions Unit will present their findings to a grand jury of each audited county.

# Kentucky seeks developers for more EV charging stations in rural areas

FRANKFORT, Ky. (KT) – Gov. Andy Beshear announced a request for proposals (RFP) to further expand Kentucky’s network of fast-charging stations to support reliable, long-distance travel for electric vehicle drivers across the state.

“Electric vehicles are no longer the technology of the future, they’re here now,” Beshear said. “We’re excited by the progress we’re making to expand our charging network, and we will keep working until Kentucky has the network required to meet the needs of the families that rely on our roads each day.”

This is the fourth RFP under the state’s

EV Charging Program, which has supported the opening of 12 fast-charging sites to date. In total, Kentucky is expected to receive nearly \$70 million in federal funds from the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Program established through the historic Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

Previous proposals focused on Kentucky’s Alternative Fuel Corridors (AFCs) along its interstates and parkways, where the current 12 open sites and the 16 under construction are located. This latest proposal seeks private developers who will design, build, operate, and maintain the stations in other urban and ru-



ral areas not already served by those stations, helping ensure EV infrastructure reaches communities across Kentucky.

This includes rural portions of counties, some parkways such as the Bluegrass Parkway, as well as

routes connecting interstates and parkways: U.S. 23, U.S. 68, U.S. 25E, U.S. 27 and U.S. 127, AA Highway in central and eastern Kentucky; U.S. 68, KY 80, U.S. 51 and U.S. 60 in western Kentucky; and urban areas such as Ashland, Coving-

ton, Lexington, Elizabethtown, Owensboro and Henderson.


Each station must have at least four charging ports and be accessible to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

NEVI funds totaling \$55 million have been

obligated for fast-charging stations in Kentucky.

“Reaching a milestone of 12 open sites was a big step to ease range anxiety for EV drivers who live in Kentucky and those who are visiting our state,” said Transportation Cabinet Secretary Rebecca Goodman. “Additional fast-charging stations statewide will make a real difference for Kentuckians and those visiting the commonwealth.”

We realize that within our social network, many are not really deeply connected with us, and that is alright. We accept that we will not be best friends with everyone, and no doubt, these casual friends also feel the same way about us. Have you ever been talking with someone and as they ask how you are, they instantly

move on to another subject before you hardly have a chance to answer? I believe a true friend is someone who really cares about what's going on with us. They laugh when we laugh and cry when we cry. Donna Roberts is quoted as saying, "A true friend knows the song in my heart and sings it to me when my memory fails."

The story of Jesus praying in the garden of Gethsemane just before he was to be crucified allows us to see a brief moment of His human side and how He really wanted the spiritual and emotional support of His friends as He was facing death. Since Christ experienced so many things in his life, we can know that he understands loneliness and the value of having someone walk with us in our

journey. As the story is told in all four gospels, he asked three of his close friends to accompany him to a quiet place called the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. When they arrived, he asked them to stay awake and pray, as he was going a little further down the path to pour out his heart to the Father. As He walked away, it's clear that He felt an overwhelming sadness and anguish as his words are recorded in Matthew 26:38, "My soul is exceedingly sorrowful, even unto death: tarry ye here, and watch with Me."

The very next verse is significant to his devotion to God and his determination to fulfill his mission as the sacrifice to save and forgive those who believe. "O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from Me:

nevertheless, not as I will, but as thou wilt." After a while of interceding in agony, he returns to hopefully receive some positive encouragement, but instead finds them asleep. This happens on three separate occasions, and the last time he stands over them and, with compassion, says, "Sleep on now and take your rest. Behold, the hour is now at hand, and the son of man is betrayed into the hands of sinners." Yes, they were not alert when he needed them, but just because they could not keep their eyes open does not mean they did not love him. (I would say we would have done the same thing). The point is that we all want our closest friends around us when we are walking through our experiences, whatever they are.

I've always heard there comes a time in our lives when we realize who actually matters, and who never did, and that good friends are hard to find, harder to leave, and impossible to forget. The wonders of friendship are not the outstretched hand or the kindly smile; it's the spiritual inspiration when two people mutually discover they enjoy spending time together. When we are in the hospital or in the nursing home, and our family and friends are holding our hands, we realize that these were our greatest blessings.

## THE DANGER OF DOING NOTHING

The number of victims it has claimed is incalculable. Few can resist its hypnotic appeal. It leaves its targets with a heavier heart and a lighter wallet. Worst of all, most of its captives never learn their lesson, succumbing again and again to its seductions despite swearing to never surrender. It has made a fool of me and has likely done the same to you: the checkout lane.

That's where all the junk is—candy bars, chips, soda, and other enticing empty calories that need no advertisement. And distributors have conveniently and cleverly

placed such delectable treats there because they know you are stuck with nothing to do but wait in line—and look. You grab what you need and go your way in the rest of the store, but movement stops at the checkout lane. Temptation lies within arm's reach, and before long, a chocolate bar or some other I'll-never-buy-this-again item slithers into your shopping cart. Idleness plus temptation equals another pointless purchase, and another disappointed victim.

Doing nothing is dangerous, especially in the Christian life. Idleness presents believers with an opportunity to "check out" what sin has to



offer. Inactivity leads to sin-activity. When movement stops, temptation starts. Just ask David—the Scripture says that he "tarried in Jerusalem," dilly-dallying when he should have been at war until his eyes wandered toward a bathing Bathsheba, and the rest is shameful history (cf. 2 Sam.

11).

This is why the Bible speaks so strongly about idleness and spiritual neglect. Solomon cautioned that doing nothing to maintain your house will result in its deterioration, and neglecting to care for your soul will lead to its decline (Eccl. 10:18). He similarly

taught that an idle person's life will be overrun with evil, just as a vineyard becomes overgrown due to negligence from a lazy gardener (Prov. 24:30-34). Paul also asserted that failing to be busy doing the Lord's work results in being busy doing the devil's work (2 Thess. 3:11). The Scripture even teaches that an "abundance of idleness" was one of the greatest iniquities of Sodom (Ezek. 16:49).

But you can vanquish idleness the same way you overcome temptation in the checkout lane: be vigilant, look away, and keep on moving. Believers must watch themselves and watch out for the devil's wiles (Gen. 4:7;

Gal. 6:1; 1 Peter 5:8). Christians must also be "always abounding in the work of the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58b), remaining occupied with serving Christ, praying often, reading Scripture, and participating in the local church. The great Puritan Isaac Ambrose wisely warned, "As a standing pool grows filthy of itself and full of toads and vermin, so the heart that is not engaged in something good and useful is a fit place for the devil to breed evil thoughts and filthy passions in." Save yourself some money and be watchful in the checkout lane. And save yourself some regret by resisting the subtle danger of idleness.
