Artwork inspired by national park forests showcased in new exhibition

Minda Douglas, associate professor of fine arts, is featured in the campus Art Gallery, with work inspired by national parks in the western United States and Canadian Rockies.

KOKOMO, Ind. — Artwork inspired by Canadian and American national parks is featured in the new exhibition opening Monday (July 13) in the Indiana University Kokomo Art Gallery. Forest Narratives features nearly 2 dozen artworks created by Minda Douglas, associate professor of fine arts, during her fall 2025 sabbatical, which included time in national parks in the western United States and Canada. The exhibition continues through Wednesday, September 16, with a reception from 4 to 6 p.m. Wednesday, September 2. Douglas will give an artist talk at 5 p.m. during the reception. She chose Jasper National Park in Alberta to see the effects of the July 2024 wildfire and to view the boreal forests; Pacific Rim National Park in



British Columbia for its temperate rainforests, in particular the western red cedars sacred to the First Nations people; and also visited Glacier National Park in Montana and Olympic National Park in Washington. “What I was interested in at Jasper was how the forest and nature have responded to the wildfire,” she said. “I was wondering what

the regeneration was looking like, and how the place would feel. I was open to whatever I would experience.” That work focused on the fragmentation of ecology or nature, and how things can be pushed beyond the brink of recovery, but also about the resilience of the forest rebounding back. The effects of the wildfire were different in various areas of the park, with some rebounding and others still devastated. “The wildflowers were going crazy, and the aspen trees were coming up, there was a feeling of this regeneration happening in some parts,” Douglas said. “In others, there was more of a devastation feel, like it wasn’t going to be able to rebound very easily or very quickly.” That park inspired charcoal drawings, photography, and collage work, including a series called Forest

Fragment, comprised of burned chunks of wood isolated on a white background. “That was inspired by the idea that the forest was very fragmented and struggling to rebound and recover from the fire,” she said, adding that in some cases, wildfires are beneficial in burning off underbrush and adding nutrients to the soil. “They had a particularly hot and dry summer which led to a very vast and very hot and very strong wildfire that was much more devastating than helpful. Those five charcoal drawings are more of a negative take on what’s happening with some of the devastating wildfires.” She also created pieces focused on regeneration, highlighting the aspen trees. “Aspen trees send up roots laterally,” she said. “Their roots are underground

and can send up new trees. They have a particular tolerance for recovery. I found that fascinating that among the burnt forest floor there were green trees poking up and big and colorful wildflowers.” Working in cyanotype, collage, and photography, she created prints of the burned aspen forests, cutting them apart and weaving them back together. On Vancouver Island, Pacific Rim National Park offered the opportunity to see some of the largest and oldest Western Red Cedars in the world, and to create her largest work of the exhibition, Sacred Cedar. “The work that was inspired by things out there was focused more on the spiritual quality of forests and trees, and what they mean to people,” Douglas said. The First Nations people held the trees as sacred, and used them for weaving, clothing, baskets, ceremonies, and canoes. “The cedars were a big part of their lives,” she said. “Cedar is a wood that is long-lasting. It doesn’t rot very easily. It has a lot of medicinal uses and functional uses. They considered them very sacred. I wanted to do a piece that encapsulated that idea. That idea is so powerful, so big, so important, it was hard for me to come up with what it had

to be.” Finally, she came up with the idea of making the cedar tree into the Milky Way galaxy, incorporating images of cedar leaves and branches onto an 8-foot by 8-foot spiral galaxy carved from gator board and collaged. In addition, she also made weavings, and a series of tiny artists books inspired by the tiny elements of a forest, such as mushrooms and lichen. Douglas said she was thankful to have the sabbatical time to travel and create new work and was grateful for the grant funding she received that made it possible. “Grants provided by the campus and IU as a whole provided me the opportunity to do this work,” she said, adding that her time away meant colleagues took on extra work, and she was not available to work with students. “It took a lot of resources and sacrifices from other people to give me this opportunity,” she said. “I recognize and appreciate that.” The IU Kokomo Art Gallery is in the Library Building, 2300 S. Washington St. It is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and closed Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. Admission is free, and free parking is available on campus. "Do you know how to blow up balloons, Brandon?" the surgical staff asked. Of course I knew how—I wasn't a sissy. In fact, one of my proudest moments as a kid was inflating a balloon by myself. But, instead of handing me a bright balloon to enjoy, the medical team strapped a mask on my face and instructed me to blow into it like I was inflating a balloon. They were

administering anesthetics through it to knock me out during my tonsillectomy, and after two breaths, I was in Snoozeville. Anesthesia is a godsend in modern medical advancement. It is better than chomping down on a hunk of wood or chugging a bottle of whiskey to make painful procedures bearable. But the sedation-induced sleep doesn't last forever, and it doesn't compare to hitting the hay after a long day. The

pain-free sleep that anesthesia provides lasts only a few hours until its effects wear off. At best, it offers temporary tranquility and peace that isn't permanent. The world also offers a perishable peace and spurious serenity that wears off faster than anesthesia. It lasts for only a little while, and then you wake up in distress all over again. The world may tell you that peace comes to those who follow their heart and fulfill their selfish ambitions,

but the end result is always dissatisfaction and chaos. The world's prescription for peace is found in pill and beer bottles, but such external things can never produce internal peace in the soul. And the reason the world's peace is fleeting is because it is false. James warned that pursuing selfish ambitions produces disorder, not peace (James 3:17). Living life for yourself results in death, not a happy and harmonious life: "For to set the mind on the flesh is death,

but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace" (Rom. 8:6; cf. Isaiah 48:22). And peace cannot be found in drugs or alcohol, as they are simply "broken cisterns that can hold no water" (Jer. 2:13). True and lasting peace can only come from Jesus: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27). The best the world can offer is anesthesia

for your soul. But the "God of peace" will grant you a "peace that surpasses all understanding" if you will trust in Him and believe on His Son, Jesus (2 Thess. 3:6; Phil. 4:7). And Jesus invites you to seek true peace from Him: "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11:28-29). What kind of peace do you have: phony or permanent? Do you have "anesthesia" for your soul, or have you come to Jesus for the real thing?

Marion students excel on Advanced Placement exams

Dozens of Marion High School students’ hard work and dedication has earned them success on the College Board’s Advanced Placement exams. MHS students took 11 different AP exams in the 2025-26 school year, and in four subjects, 100 percent of students taking the exam passed! Overall, 87 students passed at least one exam, while 30 of those passed multiple exams — both an increase over the previous year.

In seven subjects, MHS students surpassed the state and/or global percentage of students passing the exams:

Calculus AB: 100 percent MHS passing rate; state passing 64 percent; global passing rate 65.8 percent

Calculus BC (advanced): 100 percent MHS passing rate; state passing 80.7 percent; global passing rate 78.6 percent

Chemistry: 100 percent at MHS; state, 83 percent; global, 81.4 percent

Research: MHS, 100 percent; state, 90.9 percent; global, 89.8

percent
Calculus BC (2nd-year): MHS, 87.5 percent; state, 80.7 percent; global, 78.6 percent

Biology: MHS, 80 percent; state, 67.2 percent; global, 71.2 percent

3D Art and Design: MHS, 75 percent; state, 77.7 percent; global, 74.3 percent (wondering what art portfolios consist of? You can see examples from previous years here.)

Enrollment in our AP courses has increased significantly over the past few years. In 2025-26, MHS students took and passed 11 different exams: Biology; Calculus (AB and BC); Chemistry; English Language and Composition; Environmental Science; Human Geography; World History; AP Seminar (an interdisciplinary course); AP Research; and the portfolio-based 3D Art and Design.

AP exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 5. A score of 3 designates the student as “qualified” and capable of doing

the work of an introductory-level course in a particular subject at college, according to the AP Program’s website. Many colleges and universities grant credit and placement for scores of 3, 4 or 5, but the AP Program’s website notes that each college decides which scores it will accept.

Marion High School requires that students taking an AP class take the corresponding AP exam in order to receive the extra credit available for the class. (All AP classes at MHS are “weighted”, meaning that students can earn more credit for those classes because of their difficulty, as compared to standard classes. But students who don’t take the AP exam won’t receive that extra credit.) This leads to a very high percentage of MHS AP students taking the corresponding exams — which makes the passing percentages achieved by MHS students even more impressive.

Since 1955, the rigorous Advanced

Placement Program has enabled millions of students to take college-level courses and exams and to earn college credit or placement while still in high school.

According to a study cited on the AP Program’s website, AP students have better four-year college graduation rates than those who did not take AP. Taking AP also increases eligibility for scholarships and makes candidates more attractive to colleges.

Indiana Wesleyan secures 29th CL All-Sports trophy

JACKSON, Mich. – Indiana Wesleyan edged Marian for the 2025-2026 Crossroads League All-Sports Championship, giving the Wildcats their 24th All-Sports Trophy since 2000 and their 29th in school history.

IWU held off Marian by a 166.0 to 163.5 margin for the top

spot in the standings, marking the 12th-straight year that Indiana Wesleyan and Marian have claimed the top two spots in the chase for the CL All-Sports Trophy. Spring Arbor (124.5), Taylor (122.0) and Huntington (107.0) followed Indiana Wesleyan and Marian in the top-five.

The Men’s All-Sports Standings had an identical order, with IWU securing the top spot with 74.0 points

for a six-point gap over Marian. The Knights of MU took the Women’s All-Sports Trophy with 90.5 points for a 7.5-point lead over IWU.

“We are incredibly proud of all our teams,” said Indiana Wesleyan Associate Athletic Director, Hannah Miller. “It is a blessing to see our student-athletes live out our mission to both pursue competitive excellence

and to influence others for Christ as they participate within a highly competitive league, as well as to share a similar mission with our fellow Crossroads League member institutions.”

Indiana Wesleyan finished near the top of the CL standings across the board in 2025-2026, finishing top-three in the Crossroads League in 15-of-20 CL sports,

while taking titles in men’s cross country, volleyball and softball. The Wildcats also finished runner up in men’s soccer, women’s soccer, men’s basketball, men’s indoor track, women’s indoor track, competitive cheer, women’s golf, men’s outdoor track and women’s outdoor track.

Points for the Crossroads League All-Sports

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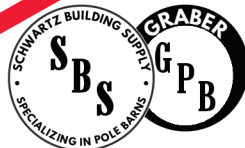

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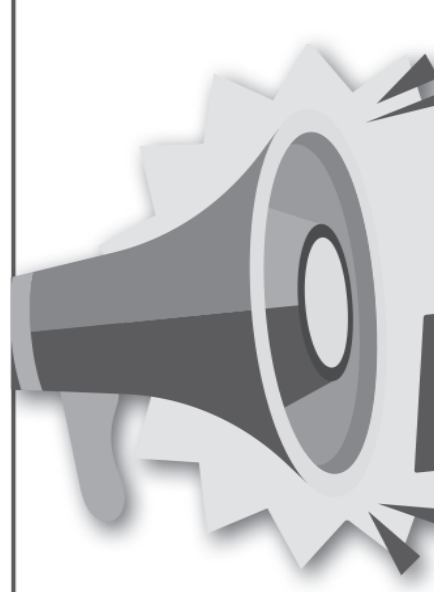
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
